

FORMER ASHLAND ESPEE EMPLOYEE TO LAST REWARD

ASHLAND, Sept. 20.—Jesse Z. Wine, a former well known Ashland resident and employee of the Southern Pacific company, died on Sunday at the Southern Pacific hospital at San Francisco. The burial service and interment will probably be held in Ashland, although definite arrangements are not yet known. Mr. Wine had been in poor health for some months and recently underwent a surgical operation at the San Francisco hospital for stomach trouble and chronic appendicitis. Since the death of Mr. Wine's wife and daughter about two years ago his health has been shaken. He had been employed until recently on a railroad between Gerber and Dunsmuir.

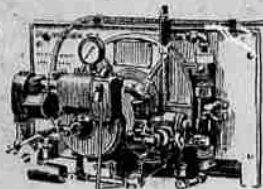
