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7 CANDIDATES FOR CITIZENSHIP IN JACKSON CO.

Seven candidates for American citizenship will present themselves for examination in circuit court here Wednesday, September 26. It is expected that V. W. Tomlinson, chief federal examiner, will be present at this hearing. His place having been filled upon the third preceding examination by his assistant, W. W. Higgins of Portland. Those who are to come up next Wednesday are: William Henry Fluhrer, who was born in Trail, B. C.; Vaclav Klimek, Czechoslovakia; Krichger, state, Sweden; Theodore Rein, Pfaffingen, Germany; Joseph Lee Shaugnessy, Pringley, Ont.; Edward Walker Jones, who was born in the state of Wisconsin but forfeited his right to American citizenship when he took out papers for a homestead in Canada; and George Stavre Avgeropoulos, Krokinton, Greece.

The naturalization examinations are held twice a year, in February and in September. Following the hearing by the examiner, committee from the American Legion and D. A. R. will conduct Americanization programs.

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JUDGE WALKER TO HEAR FEHL SUIT AGAINST PAVING

Because he objects to handing down a decision either for or against the plaintiff in the case, Judge W. E. Coyle, stated today that he has disqualified himself as judge in the Earl Fehl vs. the City of Medford paving suit, which will come before the circuit court on that date to hear the case. Judge Thomas, who has been disposing of the duties of both the county court and circuit court the past few days, will leave tomorrow night for Grants Pass, where he will hold circuit court Monday and Tuesday. Wednesday he will return to Medford for the naturalization program.

Among the business disposed by Judge Thomas yesterday was an insanity case, a juvenile delinquency case, three divorce suits and a number of equity matters.

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3 ILLEGAL DEER HUNTERS GIVEN FINES OF \$300

A trio of Klamath Falls illegal deer hunters were caught so early in the morning that they were taken to court Friday and arrested by Deputy Game Warden Roy Parr of this county and E. M. Brown, the special game deputy stationed in the Diamond Lake section, that they at once pleaded guilty, and paid over the fines assessed by the game deputies, which with their pleas of guilty, and the money were sent to Judge Taylor's court here yesterday.

Of the trio, O. W. Robertson was fined \$25 and costs for having the carcass of a mule deer in his possession without being tagged, and J. Carl Robley was fined \$25 and costs on a similar charge.

The last of the trio, Gus Melrose was fined \$100 and costs on two charges, \$75 for killing a female deer, and \$25 for not having tagged the carcass.

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
