HIGH SCHOOL WINS FROM ALUMNI 12-7 IN SLOW CONTEST

The Medford high school football team defeated the Alumni team, composed largely of members of last year's state championship team, 12 to 7 Saturday. The victory was close to 30 degrees as the two teams battled. The Alumni scored their touchdown when they blocked a punt, and fell on the ball back of the line. The high school scored first on two long forward passes, and made their second touchdown on a series of line breaks from mid-field.

The game was devoid of any special feature, but the small crowd was given a thrill when after a beautiful catch of a long forward pass from Melvin McDonald dropped the ball. McDonald initially redeemed himself later, on the same play, when he caught a pass from Melvin and then raced thirty yards for the touchdown.

The high school scored another touchdown when Harold Anderson, a moose of a kid, went thru tackle, with three Alumni players hanging to the seat of his pants. The Alumni later held the high school, when they had two inches to go. Cooks and Melvin both failed to buck the ball across of two attempts before Anderson was given the ball.

The Alumni scored when they blocked a punt, and Prock fell on the ball behind the line. Swanson kicked a beautiful goal.

The high school team is not the finished and polished team of former years by a long shot, but they played a fairly consistent game, in which Brooks Hughes, center, was the star. He broke up two or three forward passes at critical stages, and was constantly breaking through the line to break up plays.

In the third quarter Al Stoehr woke up, and threw Alumni back for losses. Shanks Green, who put on 25 pounds last summer, to be a football player played guard, and the Alumni directed their plays towards him. Green, however, by G. Arches stopped this practice together.

GIANTS' VICTORY OVER CARDS CUT LEAD TO A GAME IN PENNANT RACE

POLO GROUNDS, NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—(AP)—The New York Giants tightened the National league race today by beating the St. Louis Cardinals 8 to 5 before a roaring crowd of 40,000. The victory cut the Cardinals' lead to a single game.

STANFORD FIRST SQUAD WINS AS RESERVES BEATEN

STANFORD STADIUM, Palo Alto, Calif., Sept. 22.—(AP)—The Stanford first team pounded and passed its way to a 21 to 8 victory over the Army West coast eleven here today but the victory was a sour aftermath to the second team's 7 to 0 defeat by the San Francisco Y. M. C. A. It was the first game of the double-header which opened Stanford's 1928 grid season.

The Stanford first eleven, all-crews with the exception of Art Man, right tackle, was not impressive in its victory. The team showed little of the power which it displayed last year in tying for conference honors. The Stanford victory can be accredited only to the greater experience of Warner's men.

Roosevelt trophy FOR BEST COWBOY GOES TO CROSBY

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 22.—(AP)—The \$4,500 Theodore Roosevelt trophy, emblematic of the world's champion all around cowboy, will from now on rest permanently in Keona, New Mexico. Bob Crosby of that city, champion in 1925 and 1927, carried off the honors at the annual Pendleton round-up this year in a thrilling steer roping contest in which he was never headed for three days.

Thirty thousand spectators today watched Crosby win his honor after a pointless showing at Cheyenne. This same multitude watched Tuck Greenough ride King Tut to submission and win the bucking championship of the world.

Norman Cowan, all around king in 1926, was second, and Gay Cash, third.

Ydelle Woods rode U-Tell-Eu into the tangle and won the world's best bucking championship title. Dick Shelton won the title to champion bullroger of the world for 1928 with three throws in a traction over 52 seconds.

Crosby was selected as the prettiest Indian maiden present and was awarded the title of all-American beauty.

The 1928 round-up ended tonight.

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GRAPPLER GIVEN WRECK DAMAGES

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 22.—(AP)—Damages aggregating \$1,094.56 were awarded to Robin Reed, former professional wrestler, and Olympic champion, against the Portland, McMinnville & Coast Truck Service, by a jury in circuit court here today. The jury deliberated nearly six hours.

The suit was the result of an accident at Newberg in September, 1927, when Reed was injured in a collision between his automobile and a truck belonging to the trucking service. A piece of glass lodged in his eye, causing Reed to lose the sight of the eye for some time.

Reed asked damages of \$120,918, alleging that the accident had ended his career as a wrestler. The verdict awarded him \$371.50 property damages, \$323.06 doctor and hospital bills, and \$1,000 special damages.

This water power must be preserved in public ownership.

"Never should this priceless right be given away for private exploitation," he added, "and in whatever form the power generated at Boulder dam shall be distributed, public authority must retain the contractual rights to control the rates to be charged to the ultimate consumer, and to control by contract the fair and reasonable distribution of the power to be generated."

"This does not mean," he explained, "that the government-national or state—is required to engage in the business of distributing electrical energy, but it does mean that by virtue of this ownership, both of site and of plant, the government shall have."
