Mr. Maud wants the public to distinctly understand that he is not laying down in the controversy and that he pleaded guilty only because he and Mrs. Maud, who have been at their cabin since last May, had planned to leave next Saturday for Honolulu, and for him to have entered a plea of not guilty would have meant a jury trial, which would doubtless delay the Honolulu trip.

PRINCE GEORGE OF ENGLAND NOT A LOCAL VISITOR
