SMITH HECKLERS DISTURB MEETING DENVER, COLO.

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 25.—(AP.)—Reference by Senator Curtis, the republican vice presidential nominee, to Governor Smith at a rally here tonight brought two hecklers into action and both were arrested by police without incident in the crowded auditorium.

One of the hecklers was a woman who shrieked, over and over, "Don't talk about the 'Slaveholders of New York'."

"You would tear down the statue of Liberty," the speaker in the audience shouted, "and put one up of Andrew Mellon in its place."

"Andrew Mellon," Curtis replied, "is the best secretary of the treasury this country has ever had."

As the police rushed toward the woman, she ran to the other side of the hall, shouting over and over, "Don't say that about 'The Slaveholders of New York'!" She, too, was arrested.

The crowd cheered when the speaker followed up a minute later with the statement that "I came here to talk to men and women who prefer to march to the music of 'The Star-Spangled Banner'."

Curtis emphasized his promise for a higher protective tariff and declared in favor of full protection to the last sugar refinery.

After his speech here, Curtis turned south, speaking in Springfield, Mo., tomorrow and then going into Oklahoma for the rest of the week.

QUEEN BEATEN TO DEATH WHEN KING DIED IN CHALDEA

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 24.—(AP.)—The queen of ancient U, whose body was dug up recently in the Chaldean, was only 22 years old when she was slain so that she could be buried with her husband, according to Dr. P. W. Wainwright of Western Reserve university, an authority on the age of skeletons.

The king himself, Dr. Tait said, was only 14 when he died.

The bodies of the king, the queen and one of the pillars of the tomb were recovered in excavations at Chaldea.

"The skulls of the queen and the pillar of the tomb had been crushed," said Dr. Tait. "Evidently they had been beaten with some sort of club. It was the custom when the king died for his queen and sons to be buried with him."

The skeleton inside the examination of the problem in Chaldea this summer at the request of Mr. Arthur Kid of the college of arts and sciences of the Brown Museum.

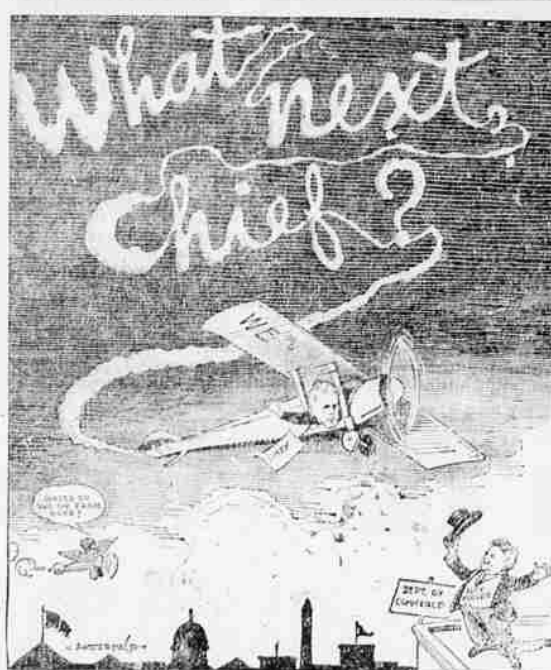

700 METHODIST PASTORS, LAYMEN SIGN FOR HOOVER

LORAIN, Ohio, Sept. 25.—(AP.)—Seven hundred pastors and laymen in session at the Northern Ohio Methodist conference here went on record today as favoring the candidacy of Herbert Hoover for president.

The action came after four hours of secret deliberation and balloting in this morning's session of the convention, and makes specific the stand taken by the group earlier in the week, when pastors and laymen adopted a resolution favoring a dry platform but mentioned no names.

Only two votes were cast against today's motion to endorse Hoover's candidacy. Roy E. L. Fowler, pastor of the First M. E. church of Cambridge, Ohio, and secretary of the committee on resolutions, presented the motion, which was as follows:

"Not because of his religion, nor his party, nor his party platform, nor because of any issue other than his life record and personal statements on prohibition, we declare ourselves opposed to Governor Alford E. Smith for the presidency."

"Not because of his religion, nor his party, nor his party platform, nor any other issue than his life record, and his personal statements on prohibition, we declare ourselves in favor of Herbert Hoover for the presidency."

DRY EVIDENCE IS STAGGERING WHEN SALOON IS WATCHED

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—(AP.)—"Staggering" evidence has found its place in prohibition enforcement procedure.

At Earl Lofgren's hearing before United States Commissioner Walker on a charge of violating the prohibition law, Lofgren's attorney sought to quash the evidence on the ground that the dry agents

obtained a search warrant improperly.

The attorney said the agents stationed themselves in front of Lofgren's saloon and, according to their affidavit, observed nine persons emerge in various stages of intoxication. One man, the affidavit said, entered the place sober and emerged staggering. With this evidence the search warrant was obtained.

The hearing was continued until October 5 to permit government attorneys to decide whether they desired to make this a test case.

Spoilers Hero Dies.
BERKELEY, Cal.—(AP.)—Erik Lindblom, 71, said to have discovered gold in 1898 on the present site of the city of Nome, Alaska, died here. He made a fortune in Alaska and was reported to be the original of "Dexter" in Rex Beach's novel, "The Spoilers."

Eureka Is Bombarded.
EUREKA—(AP.)—A six-inch shell, removed from the cruiser Milwaukee after it was wrecked in 1917 off the Humboldt county coast, exploded in a pile of burning rubbish and bombarded the town with fragments of steel. No casualties were reported.

AL'S DAUGHTER KEEN SUPPORTER OF HER FATHER

GOVERNOR SMITH'S TRANCE ROUTE TO BELLENA, Mont., Sept. 24.—(AP.)—The business of running for the presidency of the United States has assumed for Mrs. John A. Warner, daughter of Governor Smith, and his companion on his first campaign trip, proportions far greater than the ordinary final interest in a father's fight. Her interest in the political significance of each speech made by her father, and in the status of Democracy in all the western states, though which the train has passed, has become noticeably keener during the first week.

One of the newspaper men suggested that she attend the press conference held with her father on the train.

"Oh, I'd love to," she agreed enthusiastically.

"Wait, I'll ask father if it will be all right."

The governor's ready "Sure, come along," resulted in her occupying a seat next to the governor. She listened with rapt attention to each question and asked expertly at her father as he pondered upon his replies.

At the conclusion she admitted that she had been very curious to know the routine of a press conference, and declared that she was immediately pleased with the discussion with which questions were fired and answered.

NEGRO KIDNAPED IN NEW YORK IS GIVEN LIBERTY

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—(AP.)—Search for Charles Holstein, Harlem negro sportsman, who was kidnaped, came to a sudden end today when he walked into a police station and announced that he had been freed by his captors.

Holstein's plight became known when Dennis Arnold of the Monmouth judge of Colored Eyes said he had received a telephone call, supposedly from Holstein, that he was kidnaped by seven men and a woman late Thursday night.

Michael Bernstein, a Harlem truckman, was arrested after Charles King, secretary of the Turf club of which Holstein was president, told police Bernstein informed him of the kidnaping and demanded ransom of \$17,000. After a time had failed to capture the kidnapers, the ransom demand was raised to \$50,000.

VAN DYKE SCORES HIS OWN CHURCH

PRINCETON, N. J., Sept. 25.—(AP.)—Dr. Henry VanDyke has issued a statement in which he says in part:

"The folly and danger of dragging the church into politics has just received a new illustration. The Rev. Dr. Walker, moderator of the Presbyterian church in the

United States of America, has just issued a pronouncement in the official organ of that church in which, in his official capacity, he declared it is 'the plain duty of every churchman to work and pray and vote for the election of Herbert Hoover.'

"This is an astounding attitude. May a humble Presbyterian, who has himself held the honorable office of moderator in that church, be permitted to ask politely by what right or authority Dr. Walker assumes this 'temporal dominion' in the United States?"

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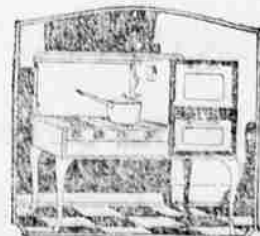
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
