

GANNA WALSKA IS INDIGNANT OVER CUSTOM RULING

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Rights of the modern woman form the basis of the appeal of Mme. Ganna Walska, wife of Harold P. McCormick, from the ruling of the collector of the Port of New York, that she must pay duty on clothing and jewelry valued at \$2,500,000 if she wishes to bring them into this country.

Mme. Walska had argued that she is a resident of Paris and therefore free to bring in her personal belongings without payment of any duty.

Her contention was overruled by Philip Elting, collector of the port, and her lawyer has appealed to Washington. The collector ruled that as she is the wife of a citizen of the United States whose residence is in this country so her residence also is here.

The appeal points out that Mme. Walska and Mr. McCormick, although not legally separated, have been living separately and that she has established her residence abroad by purchasing a home, a theatre and setting up a business establishment in Paris. Taking up the old common law which regards a man and wife as a single identity, Henry D. Hudley, her lawyer, writes in part:

"The enlightened and progressive conception of feminine rights has worn away every rule of law or custom which placed the wife in a different or less favorable position as a human being than her husband."

"The right to own and manage her own property, to retain her earnings and to protect and safeguard her rights by the vote has now become an accepted fact. The proposition that a wife is an independent thinking being whose wishes are not subordinate to those of her husband is now almost universally accepted as axiomatic."

Whatever the ruling in Washington it was indicated that the case probably would be contested in the highest court of jurisdiction in the country, the court of customs appeal.

Mme. Walska was permitted to take from her trunks a few belongings which customs officials said had been purchased in this country and were therefore not dutiable. If she loses her case, the trunks can be shipped back to Paris without payment of duty.

MOTHER OF BERT BATES PASSES ON

ROSEBURG, Ore., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Mrs. Lottie Zoe Bates, wife of the editor of the Roseburg News-Review, died at Mercy hospital in this city this morning, following an illness which had extended over a period of 10 years. During the past year she had been bedfast practically all of the time.

She was born near Independence, Ore., August 19, 1877, and received her early education in the schools of Klickitat county, Washington and Portland, Ore. She was married at Portland February 26, 1896, to E. W. Bates, and came to Roseburg four years later, and resided here continuously after that time until three years ago, when she moved to Portland because of her health.

Mr. Bates, two sons, Bertram G. and Roy Bates, and a daughter, Mrs. J. E. Dillard, all of Roseburg, survive her. She also leaves three grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

BOURBON SOLON WITHDRAWS HIS DRINK CHARGE

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Clarence Darrow, Chicago criminal lawyer, today reiterated his denial that he had ever told anyone that he had had "numerous drinks with Herbert Hoover," but said he had said something to a supporter of Mr. Hoover before the war "that might have led to an inference that I had had a drink with him."

Mr. Darrow's comment was in reply to a statement by Senator William Bruce, Democrat of Maryland, who said he would accept Mr. Darrow's "unequivocal denial" that he had taken drinks with the Republican nominee after Mr. Darrow had denied a statement by Senator Bruce that the Chicago lawyer had said he had "several drinks" with Mr. Hoover.

Mr. Darrow said the report of Senator Bruce's speech to the effect that he had said he had had several drinks with Mr. Hoover was incorrect, but added that "I did say something in a conversation which I supposed was not for publication to a supporter of Mr. Hoover's before the war."

From this statement, he said, an inference might be drawn that he had had a drink with Mr. Hoover. Then he added:

"Whether I said that or not I shall not now state. I thought then and I think now that statement I made was correct. Still, there is a possibility of a mistake. I referred to a time during the war in London before Mr. Hoover was a constitutional officer of the United States."

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Pasquale Copotosto has been arrested as the "keyman" to the kidnaping-extortion ring which police have uncovered through investigations in the Billy Ramlert abduction case.

Police said Copotosto had been identified by four prominent contractors as a member of an organization which had tried to extort money from them. Extortion plots have been directed toward more than 210 Italians during the past six months, police said, with at least 100 of them paying the tribute demanded.

Copotosto, according to police, penned 225 letters demanding money under threats of death or kidnaping.

SELLING GIRLS TO FEED STARVING IN FAMINE DISTRICTS

SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Marriageable girls of the famine area along the Chihli border in northeast Shantung are being sold in Shansi as a means of relieving the distress in thousands of homes, said Earl Baker of New York, who returned today from his second inspection of the district. He said that the famine area is 60 per cent larger than he believed it to be a month ago. At that time, he said, it was 30 miles wide and 100 miles long.

Mr. Baker said that Shansi was the best market for marriageable girls because that province had experienced a shortage of women since the famine there of 1920-21. At that time Shansi women were sold just as Shantung and Chihli women are now being marketed, thus depleting the feminine population. He stated that some girls are bringing as much as \$200 in gold.

He found the population of the famine area suffering as much distress as when in August grasshoppers formed one of the principal articles of diet. Even worse conditions are awaiting them when winter sets in.

Mr. Baker intends to sail for Seattle next Friday. He will go to New York and report to the New York famine committee.

ATTEMPT TO GET DWIGHT MORROW IS FRUSTRATED

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 25.—(AP)—El Universal today expressed the belief that an attack staged by 25 bandits on the village of Huiztlac, midway between Mexico City and Cuernavaca, was directed against Dwight W. Morrow, American ambassador.

Mr. Morrow, who was spending the week end at his new residence in Cuernavaca, arrived in Huiztlac after the bandits had been driven off, and proceeded to Mexico City, arriving there safely.

The newspaper asserted that someone in Cuernavaca had warned the bandits by telephone of Mr. Morrow's departure by automobile and the coup failed because the outlaws failed to take Huiztlac before he arrived.

The bandits in marching toward Huiztlac did not attempt to hold up any passing automobiles, apparently being bent on seizing the town. The men were dressed in the uniform of federal soldiers and were thought to have intended to take the village garrison by surprise. The soldiers, however, opened fire upon the bandits when they failed to recognize them and the outlaws fled to the mountains after a brisk encounter.

HOSS TAKES SAM'S JOB AND SAM IS GIVEN A NEW ONE

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 25.—(AP)—The formalities attending the shifting of state officialdom wherein Sam A. Koser becomes director of the state budget and Hal E. Hoss succeeds Koser as Secretary of state were completed yesterday when Governor Patterson announced their appointments and signed their commissions.

A peculiarity of the situation was that Koser, as secretary of state had to countersign the appointment of Hoss, while Hoss in turn, had to countersign Koser's commission.

For four years, as custodian of the state capital, by virtue of being secretary of state, Koser had a hard job finding office space for various departments in the congested state house. Now it is necessary for Hoss to cast about for office room for Koser.

"I guess we can squeeze him in somewhere," Hoss remarked. The turning over of the office proved to be very informal. Koser, Hoss, Carl D. Gabrielson of the motor vehicle department, Dr. E. E. Lee Steiner of the state hospital, and a newspaperman drifted casually into the private office of the state department.

"Let's see, Sam, you've been here how long?" asked Dr. Steiner. "It will be 30 years on January 1," answered Koser.

"Thirty years?" marveled Steiner. "And better than eight years as secretary of state. I want to tell you Sam, that you've done a lot of things to be proud of. If you hadn't you wouldn't be here now. If Hal does as well, he'll do doggone good."

Sam grinned. "Thanks Doc," he said. "You're right, doctor. I've got a high mark to shoot at." Hoss conceded. "If you'll let me sit down there, Sam, I'll sign this commission of yours," Hoss added. "You bet," responded Koser. "I'm very glad to turn it over to you."

Hoss scratched his signature to Koser's new commission. It's a different kind of signature from the smooth clerical signature that Koser has been appending to the state documents for so many years and that has become so familiar in every household in the state. Hoss' signature—well, it's a signature all right. That's about all that can be said for it—Hal's been in the newspaper game so long. But anyway it's a signature that will easily become familiar to everyone.

The next official act awaiting Hoss was one that had been saved for him. This was the signing of a warrant for \$1,609,991.43, payable from the state highway fund to State Treasurer Kay and covering principal and six months interest on state highway bonds.

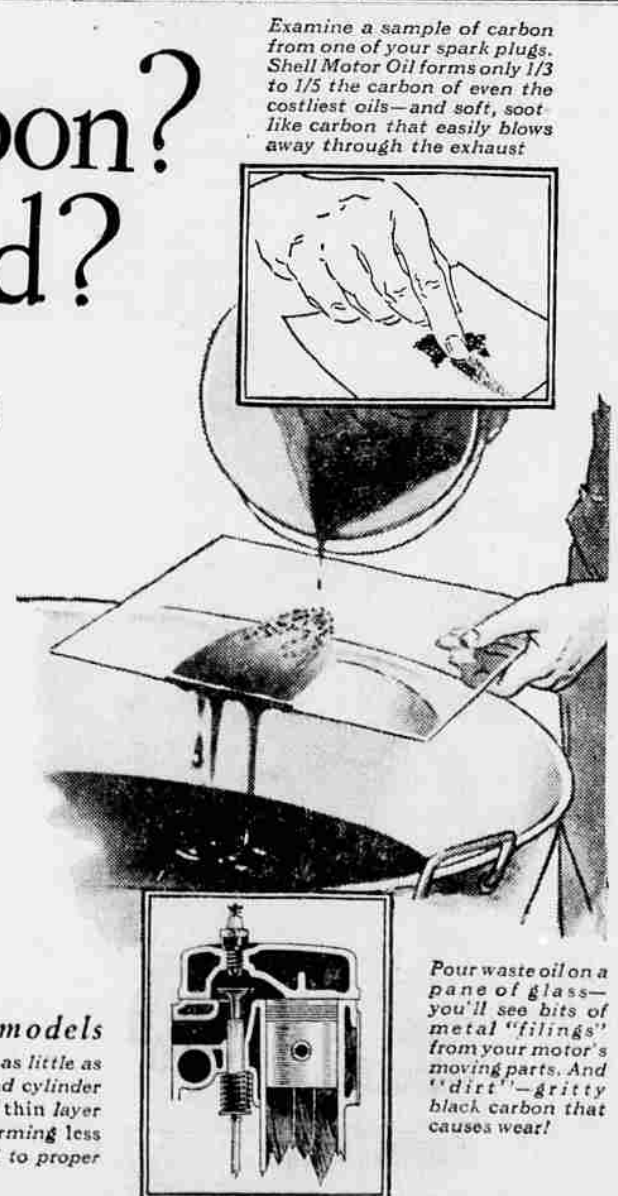
