

CIGAR MAGNATE MARRIES WIDOW OF EX-PARTNER

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—(AP)—David A. Schulte, head of the United-Schulte Cigar Stores, and his bride of four days, the former Mrs. E. H. Koehler, were on a wedding cruise aboard his yacht today.

They were married in Stamford, Conn., Saturday but the fact was not generally known until an announcement by his business associates here last night. They had not known of the marriage, it was said until inquiries caused them to get in touch with the chain store magnate, who confirmed the rumors.

Schulte and his first wife separated in 1926, but that there had been a divorce was not generally known until the announcement of the wedding. The first Mrs. Schulte has been given custody of their three children. The present Mrs. Schulte is the widow of E. H. Koehler, business associate of Schulte's and former treasurer of Park & Tilford, one of the Schulte enterprises. Mr. Koehler died three years ago.

Mr. Schulte who is 55 years old rose from an \$18 a week store clerk to one of the largest chain store operators in the country. Although his wealth runs into millions he has retained his simple tastes. When in New York he goes to work on the subway from his Park avenue apartment.

ARREST MEDFORDITE FOR SELLING AUTO

MADERA, Cal., Sept. 25.—(AP)—J. E. Trolinger was arrested here yesterday charged with taking a car from Medford, Ore., and selling it in Berkeley while there was still a balance due on the purchase price. He is alleged to have changed the engine number plates in order to effect the sale.

The local authorities will take no action in this matter, and Chief of Police Charles McCredie today wired Madera, Calif., to this effect, which will result in the release of Trolinger today.

The automobile in the case was a Ford, Trolinger purchased from the Mason Motor company of this city. He owed a very small balance on the auto.

The sheriff's office has not been advised what action will be taken upon the California law, prohibiting the altering of engine numbers.

Chinese General Not Only Lost War But 20 of Wives

MUKDEN, Manchuria, Sept. 25.—(AP)—General Chang Tsung Chang, the picturesque Chinese leader who rose from a coolie laborer in Harbin to dictator of Shantung province, can locate only 8 of his 28 wives and concubines and this is worrying him more than the reverses he suffered in battle last week.

A little more than ten days ago Chang bid a fond farewell to the female members of his household.

In the fierce fighting that followed Chang met defeat, his troops surrendered and his wives scattered in every direction. He has located five concubines in Mukden, one Russian wife at Harbin and two more in Korea, but the whereabouts of the 20 others is what the defeated dictator is frantically trying to learn.
