CARDS LOSE AS GIANTS CHEER FOR

Dazzy Vance Holds League Leaders Helpless, While Brooklyn Brings in Six Runs—Giant Squad in Grand Stand Cheer, As Pennant Victory Looms Half Game Ahead.

BROOKLYN, Sept. 26.—(AP) Dazzy Vance hauled the Cardinals down to within half a game of the second place Giants by defeating the league leaders here today by a score of 6 to 1 in the final game of the series. The idle Giants sat in the stands and applauded his effort.

Vance gave the Cardinals just five scattered hits and seldom was in danger after the first round when he walked four men to force home the only St. Louis run. The extreme cold seemed to hamper the Brooklyn ace in this round but once he warmed up to his task, he breezed through the Cardinal batting order in his best form.

BROOKLYN, Sept. 26.—(AP) The Cardinals, leading the Giants by one game in the pennant race, encountered Dazzy Vance in the final game of the Brooklyn series here today as the idle Giants shivered in the stands with about 3000 paying guests. Clarence Mitchell opposed Vance in the hope of winning his first decision over the Robins this season. The dazzer was seeking seven strikeouts-out to reach the two hundred mark.

HONEYED LOVE LETTERS LURED HER TO DOOM

Police Make Public Lurid Missives Which Impelled Boston Woman to Answer Matrimonial Ad, Which Resulted in Her Brutal Murder.

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 26.—(AP)—Archie F. Much, alias Mook, mill worker, accused of killing Mrs. Katherine Clark of Boston, announced through his attorney today that he would ask for a change of venue to King county. He gave as his reason his belief that he could not receive a fair trial in Spokane.

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 26.—(AP)—The honeyed letters that lured Mrs. Katherine Clark of Boston, Mass., to her death here at the hands of a hatchet slayer were typical "mail order matrimony" missives, their publication here today revealed.

Mrs. Clark, said to be prominent in Boston, was brutally beaten to death with a hatchet's hatchet in a lonely spot about 15 miles from Spokane. Archie Much, 26-year-old mill worker, has been formally charged with her murder as a result of the discovery of a packet of the love missives, together with \$1350, believed to be the balance of the amount that Mrs. Clark brought with her to Spokane.

Early in the correspondence between Much and Mrs. Clark, the mill worker insisted that she bring her money with her. In his first letter he told the woman, with whom he had gotten acquainted through a matrimonial agency, that he was worth \$100,000.

"I will give a description of myself," he wrote. "I am 32 years old and weigh 200 pounds. Am not a bad looking, have a fair education and worth \$100,000." The letter concluded with "May I be yours sincerely."

One-Woman Man
On July 2 he wrote, "I have had experience in reading handwriting and feel I could love you. I am a one-woman man."

"Murphy" then said that his father had tried to compel him to marry another woman, but he had refused the marriage but he had decided to marry and get \$100,000 which would go to him if he married by September 24. He said he must have \$10,000 and explained that Mrs. Clark must bring \$2000 to add to his money so that he could obtain \$100,000 from a bank. In a later letter he asked her to bring her money so he "could bathe his eyes" in it.

"Murphy" dangled a life of ease instead of work in a shop before the eyes of Mrs. Clark, professing an apparent suggestion that she could open a shop in Spokane after her arrival in the west.

"I do not want you to go into business," he wrote. "I just want you to be my love. A honey-moon, and, say, baby, you will have a real one. I like the new style blouses and you can choose your car when we return from Europe."

After Mrs. Clark had consented to come to Spokane early this month, a letter dated September 21 said "I have been thinking of you all the time and I shall hug and kiss you for one hour. My heart is going two beats faster. I do wish I had your picture. Well, my adorable girl, are you ready? Ready to come to my arms? Let me prove my love. It seems to me love. It seems to me I cannot wait much longer. Now, baby, I want to kiss you."

Wife Sticks to Him
Mrs. Much has risked to the rescue of her husband. "If they hang him and he confesses, even then I will never believe it," was her fearful declaration yesterday afternoon. "I know him too well. He never could have done such a thing. Why he has never anything but good to say of me. He loved us and was always home."

By us, Mrs. Much was referring to herself and their five young children.

Mrs. Much, fearing that her children will go hungry now that the family has been deprived of the wages of Much, has attempted to get work in a laundry, where she will be paid \$14 a week.

Death Toll of the Automobile

OREGON CITY, Ore., Sept. 26.—(AP)—Victim of a skidding automobile which overturned on the Pacific highway near Canby, while en route to the state fair from Seaside, Alice Viola Wilson, 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Wilson, was killed by injuries in the Oregon City hospital last night. Her mother and two sisters are in the same institution, suffering from similar internal injuries and skull fractures. Ed May of Salem, brother of Mrs. Wilson, suffered minor injuries.

BLIZZARDS IN MID-WEST AND FROST IN EAST

Chicago Visited By Earliest Winter in History—Snowfall in Dakotas Breaks Down Trees—Mercury 14 Degrees Below Freezing.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—(AP)—While geese were going south today, their distant homelands heralding the approach of winter, the first breath of which chilled the northern part of the United States yesterday from the Rocky mountains east to the sea.

Snow fell in some parts of the country, in the Great Lakes region, the Berkshires and the Alleghenies with frost in many other sections and temperatures down to freezing and near freezing.

Snow which fell for five minutes at Chicago was the earliest fall on record, the first previous recorded date being October 6 in 1896 and 1925.

The temperature was down to 46 degrees in New York with frost pending fields in the suburbs. The thermometer mark was 18 degrees below the average for the day, but not so record, as the temperature was down to 41 degrees on that date in 1887.

The lowest reading in the country was at Williston, N. D., where the temperature was 18 degrees above zero. At Ironwood, Mich., the snowfall was so heavy the branches of many trees were broken.

Light falls of snow were recorded at Pittsfield, Mass., and Hazelton, Pa., while Hinsdale, Mass., reported it cold enough to freeze water in pails.

The local weather bureau said the cold weather was not unusual for this time of the year and that there would undoubtedly be warm days before the fall weather set in in earnest.

New York park rangers believe winter is still some distance away. Although the geese are already going south, they said neither the leaves nor the beavers had given any indication of going into winter quarters.

WINDSOR, Ont., Sept. 26.—(AP) The cold wave which has spread across Canada and the northern part of the United States has caused untold loss to Canadian grain and tobacco growers.

Hundreds of acres of tobacco near St. Thomas have been destroyed by the frost and the tobacco growers of this district will suffer a heavy loss, which would cost at least a million dollars damage to the crop in this vicinity. One grower in Elgin county estimated that 15 per cent of his best tobacco was a total loss and that almost half of his crop was in such condition that it would bring only a meager price in the market.

Across on acres of grain in the area around St. Thomas, many corn and soybean crops have been damaged by the frost and many truck growers have suffered large losses in their potato and tomato crops. The corn, which is late maturing, also will be adversely affected. Farm experts believe.

SALEM WOMAN MUST GO TO THE PENITENTIARY
SALEM, Ore., Sept. 26.—(AP) In an oral order the state supreme court has refused to grant a stay of execution in the case of a state woman, Mrs. Ruth Lockwood, who was convicted of manslaughter resulting from an automobile accident and sentenced to serve two years in the penitentiary. An automobile driven by Mrs. Lockwood had run down and killed Maxine Sawyer, a Salem dragster.

AL'S AIDE IS TERMED ANANIAS

Democratic Leader in Baltimore Joins Senator Curtis in Terming Drinking Charge By Senator Bruce 'Wilful, Malicious and Deliberate Lie'—Bruce, However, Refuses Any Retraction.

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 26.—(AP)—Senator Curtis, the vice-presidential nominee, gave the lie last night to reiterated statements of Senator Bruce, Democrat, of Maryland, that Senator Curtis had taken a drink of whisky from a hip pocket flask at the inflex race track last night.

Senator Bruce, speaking Saturday at Westminster, Md., quoted James A. McGrath, a Baltimore attorney, as saying Senator Curtis had produced the whiskey from his hip pocket at the race track bar, inviting McGrath, Robert B. Egan, also a Baltimore lawyer, and John Gray of Brooklyn, N. Y., to join him in a drink. Senator Bruce reiterated the declaration last night at Baltimore, offering a written statement by McGrath.

"I dislike to say anything about a man," the vice-presidential nominee said, following his Omaha speech last night, "but if this Mr. McGrath issued that statement about me he is a wilful, malicious and deliberate liar. I never offered this Mr. McGrath or any other person any whiskey at inflex race track, or any other place. I am surprised Senator Bruce would peddle such slander."

Senator Bruce in his statement said the charge he made last Saturday night had originated with McGrath. He said he met the attorney on the street in Baltimore about the time of the Kansas City Republican convention, where he was told of the race track meeting. Following Curtis's denial of the "bottle of whisky in his pocket," McGrath reduced the story to writing and presented it to him.

Mr. Egan mentioned in the McGrath statement is a Democrat leader in Baltimore. Last night he issued a statement in which he declared having taken the drink referred to by Senator Bruce and McGrath.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 26.—(AP)—William E. North of Idaho, campaigning in the middle west for Herbert Hoover, denied that his eastern speaking schedule has been cancelled, as reported to the New York World.

"I will keep my eastern speaking dates as soon as I conclude my middle western tour reports are to the contrary are erroneous," he said.

The senator said he would speak in Minneapolis Monday and might accept a date in Milwaukee after that. This decision had been left to the Republican party's western headquarters at Chicago.

He said it had not been decided when he would come to Omaha, who is accompanying the senator to St. Paul, and who will speak here tonight.

Senator Curtis, the Republican vice-presidential candidate, ate breakfast today with Senator Bruce, who dined in his nomination at the Republican national convention.

The paths of the two senators, who are waging the Republican cause in the west, crossed here today and Kansas City Republican leaders gave them a breakfast at the Muehlenbach hotel.

The two campaigners talked things over across the breakfast table. Both declared their confidence over the Republican outlook. Senator Curtis was here a little more than an hour and departed for Springfield, Mo., accompanied by Governor Baker of Missouri and a number of Kansas City Republicans.

SMITH ADMITS SEEING NO SIGNS OF FARM DISTRESS

Democratic Candidate Says He Has Only Time to Look at Cities On Campaign Tour—Looks Not Important, Anyway—Is Pleased With His Religious Speech.

GOVERNOR SMITH'S TRAIN EN ROUTE TO MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 26.—(AP)—An overnight ride through the mountainous regions of Montana brought Governor Smith into North Dakota today, but he faced another day and night journey by train before reaching the Twin Cities of Minnesota.

Tomorrow night at St. Paul he is to deliver his fifth speech of the campaign, following a reception at Minneapolis.

There were indications that the nominee probably would elaborate at St. Paul on some of the issues he already had discussed, particularly farm relief and allied topics that might appeal to the northwestern independent elements.

He reiterated that his Oklahoma City speech would be his last on the question of religion in politics and said his personal political impression after his two-day visit to Montana was that everything appeared all right.

Hardly Seen Farms
Asked if he had noticed any evidences of "the distress about which you have been told in New York," in the farm region he had visited, the governor replied:

"What do you mean by evidence—physical evidence?"

"Yes," the reporter returned, "lack of painted houses, run down condition of farms, fences and so forth."

"I could not say as to that because I have not seen any farms. They have been so far away from the railroad track that you could not tell whether they were painted or not."

He added that he did not regard such scenes, if any existed, as a barometer of conditions.

"That may be carelessness," he explained, and continued, "I have not been looking out of the windows while we have been traveling. I have been working."

The only thing I have been doing is looking out of the windows. All the other times I have been obliged to stay at my knitting."

Asked if any state leaders had told him about the condition of the farmers, whether they were suffering or in prosperous circumstances, the governor said he did not think such information could be obtained except through statistics.

"You cannot tell anything about a fellow's financial condition by looking at him," he said.

Likes Religious Speech
The governor said he had received telegrams from all over the country expressing approval of the way in which he presented the question of party responsibility in his Helena speech, and that he had received more congratulatory messages on his Oklahoma City address than any he had made.

Senator Wheeler, Democrat of Montana, who is accompanying the nominee as far as St. Paul, and who shared honors with him in his home town of Butte yesterday afternoon during an hour's procession through several miles of crowded streets of the mining city, took part in the press conference.

Asked why Senator Norris, Republican of Nebraska, was "keeping so low in this campaign," the Montana senator, who is at rest election this year, replied that it was because "he does not approve of Hoover."

The senator said his secretary had told him of a press account quoting Senator Norris's remarks on agriculture at Omaha and on water power at Denver.

"He did not endorse Smith?" someone asked.

"No," Wheeler replied, "he did not endorse Smith, but he approved of his speech on water power at Denver and also the one on agriculture at Omaha. If what the secretary said to me is correct, I would take it as an endorsement of his stand on agriculture, and he said in substance that the Denver speech was a better speech than Hoover's on water power."

Wheeler Is Optimistic
Wheeler was asked what would be the effect of Governor Maddox of North Dakota running for election as a Democrat after at one time having been elected as a Republican with farm organization support.

"Will his defection or his bolting to Smith offset the support ofrazier and Nye to Hoover?" was the question put.

"Yes, I think it means that Smith will carry North Dakota," Wheeler returned.

HOOVER AID TO FARMER DIVULGED

Record Shows Hoover Did Not Fix War Price for Wheat, But Saved Farm Losses By Selling Farm Products at High Prices to Aid Starving Russians.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—(AP)—A vigorous denial that Herbert Hoover as war-time food administrator fixed maximum prices for farm products was contained in a pamphlet issued today by the Republican national committee. Such charges were declared to have been "wilfully or ignorantly" made.

Further, it was asserted that Hoover's record reveals a "consistent tendency to fix the farmer," and that he did "his utmost to protect and secure fair and generous dealing to the wheat growers, hog producers and other farmers of the country for their war-time efforts."

The committee declared that with the allied governments pressing to use their concentrated buying power to fix wheat prices at \$1.50 to \$1.80 per bushel and the government price for the 1918 crop already set at \$2.00 per bushel by congress, President Wilson appointed a committee to look further into the situation and this body, at a meeting which Hoover did not attend arrived at \$2.25 per bushel as a fair return to the farmer.

Wilson's Orders Quoted
To substantiate this, President Wilson was quoted as saying in a statement issued Aug. 30, 1917:

"The price recommended by that committee, \$2.25 per bushel, Chicago, for the basic grade, will be fully adhered to by the food administration. Mr. Hoover, at his express wish, has taken no part in the deliberations of the committee on whose recommendation I determined the government's fair price, nor has he in any way influenced an opinion regarding that price."

Hoover's record, it was declared, reveals him as a "close student of agriculture and a true friend of the farmers of the nation" through the following activities:

"Through personal efforts during 1919 and 1920 to develop measures of enlightened reconstruction to help the farmers to maintain their economic position.

Added Foreign Sales
"Through creation in the department of commerce of a special division in the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce with a large staff in foreign countries to promote the sale of our agricultural products abroad.

"Through taking a leading share in the summer of 1921 in reviving the war finance corporation at a critical moment, which was instrumental in halting the decline in prices of farm products.

"Through obtaining in December 1921, a congressional appropriation for purchase of corn for Russian famine relief, bolstering that market at a dark hour.

"Through his leadership in the movement for a seaway to connect the Great Lakes and the Atlantic ocean, and for completion of the Mississippi waterway system to cheaper transportation costs for farm products.

Eliminated Waste
"Through his great program for eliminating waste which was undertaken by the department of commerce and by means of which costs of manufactured commodities are being lowered for the farmers as well as other consuming groups.

"Through hundreds of minor services rendered by the department of commerce and through his concern for the needs of the farmers as revealed through his addresses and reports.

"Through his struggle to break the grip of foreign monopolies and control of prices of commodities which American farmers must have in their operations."

Will King Quits RACE FOR BENCH
SALEM, Ore., Sept. 26.—(AP) Will R. King today filed with Secretary of State Hoss his withdrawal as an independent candidate for justice of the supreme court. He was nominated by assembly. King, who is a Democrat, recently succeeded by Oswald West as national committee man for Oregon, was once a member of the supreme court.

TRAFFIC COPS FIRED FOR DEER HUNTING

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 26.—(AP)—Sergeant R. H. (Gee) Reinhardt and Officer H. W. Howard of the state traffic department have both been discharged from the state service for hunting deer at night. This was made known here today to T. A. Rafferty, state traffic inspector.

The offense was committed in Josephine county where the two officers were reported to have killed a deer with the aid of a motor vehicle spotlight. The discharge order was issued upon receipt of information from the game department.
