SATURDAY'S GAME MAY DECIDE RACE NATIONAL LEAGUE

As if by mutual consent, contenders in baseball's two major leagues have settled into a perfect lockstep which, if maintained in unbroken rhythm, automatically will carry the St. Louis Cardinals and the New York Yankees into the world's series.

The Cardinals and the New York Giants have matched strides for several days, with McKee's men always a jump ahead in their fight for their second National League pennant in three years. In the American League, Miller Huggins' Yankees have been content to win when the Philadelphia Athletics were out to lose when their only rivals saw fit to do likewise.

With the end of the campaign only five days away, the Cards today led the Giants by a single game while the Yankees enjoyed a two-game margin over the Athletics. The Yankees apparently are "in," but the National League fight may be carried right up to the final day—September 26—when the two contenders clash at the Polo Grounds. That battle will break the lockstep and may decide the new National League champions.

There was no change in the situation yesterday for the leaders in each league were returned victoriously.

The Giants and the Cardinals, however, both had close calls. The Giants apparently were doomed to defeat at the hands of Eppa Rixey and the Cincinnati Reds when the last half of the ninth opened.

The Yankees socked George Grant and Bill Bagby for six runs in the first inning and had no trouble coasting to a 10-4 triumph over the Cleveland Indians. Tom Zachary drove the Indians only eight scattered hits. Lou Gehrig clouted out his 25th homer of the season with one in the eighth.

Jimmy Dykes and five straight hits on the Athletics crushed St. Louis, 9 to 5. Jimmy's string included one double and four singles. He drove in four runs and scored two himself.

In the only other American League entertainment, Washington outdistanced its host on fourth place by trouncing the Chicago White Sox again, 2 to 0.

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TECHNICAL KAYO FOR MANDELL IN GOODRICH BATTLE

FLINT, Mich., Sept. 24.—(AP)—Jimmy Mandell was still light-weight boxing champion of the world today due to the foresight of his manager, Eddie Kane.

Although he was the victim of a technical knockout at the hands of Jimmy Goodrich in the second round of a 10-round bout last night, Mandell's title was not affected because of a stipulation inserted in the articles of agreement by Kane, that provided the buffalo veteran must win in over the lightweight limit, 125 pounds.

A round house right swing that landed early in the first round, broke the champion's collar bone and although he finished the session, he was unable to respond to the bell at the start of the second round.

A state boxing commission physician diagnosed the injury as a fracture of the middle third of the left clavicle.

Mandell was treated by a physician at his hotel and then left for his home in Rockford, Ill. He probably will be unable to fight for several months.

There was little to choose between the two boxers as far as the fight progressed. Mandell's opponent left him with a head-on collision, but he was unable to land a blow on the champion's left arm.

When the champion's left arm went limp and he played out feebly with his right until the round ended.

It was the second time in his career that Mandell has lost to Goodrich. The first meeting was part of the championship contest conducted by Tex Rickard in 1925 to choose a successor to Benny Leonard, retired lightweight champion. It ended in the sixth round when the Buffalo boxer was awarded the victory on a foul.

Subsequently, Goodrich went on to win the tournament and claim to the title. He was later defeated by Rocky Kanfield, who in turn lost to Mandell.
