

ALEX SPARROW IS NAMED COUNTY JUDGE POSITION

At a meeting of the Republican central committee this afternoon at the Hotel Medford, Alex Sparrow of Willow Springs precinct was nominated unanimously for county judge to fill the vacancy caused by the death of W. J. Hartzell, and a resolution was unanimously adopted urging Governor L. L. Patterson to appoint Sparrow county judge to fill the place between now and January 1, next. The regular term is for a six year period, beginning next January 1.

There were 35 precinct committeemen present. Frank P. Farrell acted as chairman, and Verne Marshall as secretary.

Sparrow accepted the nomination, and thanked those who had withdrawn in his favor.

"I don't mind running against any Democrat they can put up, but I absolutely refused to run if the Republican party of Jackson county was to be split," said Sparrow in a characteristic speech.

Republican precinct committeemen of Jackson county met this afternoon at the Hotel Medford, to nominate a candidate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late W. J. Hartzell, and Alex Sparrow of the Willow Springs district, will in all probability be the selection.

Mr. Sparrow, who yesterday said his doubts about acceptance had this afternoon, that he would accept, as he felt it was his duty to his friends, and to those who had worked in his behalf. Mr. Sparrow, a farmer and owner of livestock, felt that the holding of county office would interfere too much with the work that he loves best.

By reason of experience and training, Mr. Sparrow is admirably fitted for the judgeship. He was in the army for many years and there he learned how to make a quick and accurate decision. For many years he was in the national park service, for several years being superintendent of Crater Lake National park, having supervision over the road work. There is probably no man in Jackson county so thoroughly versed in all angles of road construction, and he will bring this knowledge to the county judgeship.

If and when nominated, it will be Mr. Sparrow's first venture in politics. His candidacy met with a wide and instant approval among all classes, and in all sections of the county.

The selection of Sparrow by the Republican committee is equivalent to his appointment by Governor Patterson, for it is known the governor will act favorably upon the Republican organization's recommendation.

County Treasurer A. C. Walker, in whose behalf the county judge petition has been circulated throughout the county, in a long distance telephone from Salem, where he is attending to county matters, and the state fair, told his son Verl this morning that he would not be a candidate for the judgeship upon the condition that "Victor Russell stayed out of the race." Russell issued a statement yesterday that he would not be a candidate, and would throw his support to Alex Sparrow, the leading candidate for the place.

The Noted Dead

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—(AP)—John Albert Tiffin Hull, for twenty years a member of the house of representatives from Iowa died last night at his home in Clarendon, Va., from an attack of heart trouble which began three days ago. He was 87 years of age. He is survived by two sons, Major General John A. Hull, judge advocate general of the army, Dr. Albert G. Hull of Missouri, Miss Annette Hull, who has made her home with her father. Hull served in the house from 1890 to 1916 and was identified with the military and District of Columbia committees.

DEAD BODY FOUND IN NICARAGUA MAY BE BANKER

Managua, Nicaragua, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Investigation is being made by the identity of the body of a white man with three bullet holes in the back of his head which recently was found at Waspuh, on the Coco river.

It is believed that the body may be that of George R. Marshall of New York, assistant manager of the La Luz Los Angeles gold mine, an American-owned property in eastern Nicaragua, who was captured last April by followers of the rebel leader, Sandino, when the La Luz mine was looted and destroyed.

Three rings were found on the man's fingers, but the condition of the body was such that identification was impossible.

The fate of George R. Marshall has been a mystery since shortly after the La Luz raid on April 12. First reports after the raid were that Mr. Marshall had been killed, but later advice indicated that he was still alive, and was being held by the raiders. The last definite word was on April 27 when reports were received that he was being well cared for.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27.—(AP)—Fine of \$200 was imposed in federal court today upon Mary Herman, 21, of Clifton, Ore., whose attorney, Joseph Helgeson, yesterday charged that Ralph Kelly, whom he described as a government stool pigeon, had sold the girl a gallon of liquor and returned an hour later with Federal Officer Godfrey to arrest her.

District Attorney Neuner also paraded the stool pigeon charge.

COMPANIONATE MARRIAGE BAN TO CT. ACTION

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27.—(AP)—Companionate marriage loomed as a barrier to a federal charge against Kenneth Elwood Frazer, 24, who came to Oregon from San Francisco some months ago with Miss Mary Elma Stone.

Frazer admitted stealing an automobile in Portland August 7 to take Miss Stone to Seattle, and was sentenced to 15 months in McNeil island prison, but officers found they could not press Mann act charges against Frazer because the couple had decided they would be companionately married before they left San Francisco. They were to travel together as friends for six months and if at the end of that time they were still attached to each other they were to be regularly married.

Frazer, who has a divorced wife and child in California, met Miss Stone while she was a student at the University of California and he was working in a San Francisco cafeteria. When the university term ended in May, 1928, they decided to be companionately married and they hitch-hiked to Portland. Here Frazer admitted he stole a coupe in which they drove to Seattle, but his companion believed he bought the car. The couple traveled from Seattle to Roseburg, where they were arrested. Miss Stone said she expected to meet Frazer when his term is completed.

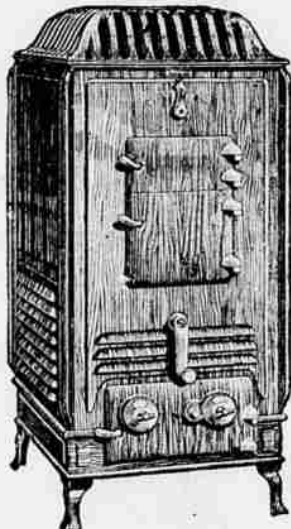
