

## IDAHO FEUD OVER ROAD RESULTS IN FATAL TRAGEDY

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, Sept. 27.—(AP) A fatal shooting for several years among three families, which had its inception in a dispute over the ownership of a private road, reached its climax today as W. O. Tharp, 49, father of four children, was held in the county jail for a month charged with murder.

Second years ago the three families quarreled over possession of the road. Two of the families sided with each other, naming Tharp and his family. Presently an understanding was reached, but one of the participants, named out against Tharp, alleging that Tharp had maliciously killed a calf owned by Rose Mrs. Lela Brown, 55, wife of Charles E. Brown, was a witness against Tharp, who was accused of murder.

Yesterday Tharp was motoring along the road with his two sons, 14 and 12. They met Walter, 14-year-old daughter of the Browns. Tharp is alleged to have stopped his automobile truck and to have struck the girl with a club and to have severely beaten her.

After the alleged beating, Walter

and the six children of Rose who were with her, ran toward their homes and Tharp is said to have pursued them, naming Mrs. Brown in her door yard. When the women caught her hand, police said Tharp fired at her, the bullet taking effect in her leg. She crawled toward a fence and Tharp then is alleged to have fired two more shots into her body, killing her.

Brown, who arrived on the scene was assisted by a bullet and crawled with Tharp. The Brown girl struck Tharp over the head with a 25-caliber revolver, and it was then the one used in the slaying of her mother. Brown then named Tharp on his reported remark that he had "enough" and to have permitted Tharp to drive his machine in the direction of the Rose home.

Mrs. Brown, according to the police, and him in the road and fired a shotgun charge into the side of the machine. Tharp, however, was not injured.

Tharp at his own residence after the shooting, surrendered to the officers.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 27.—(AP) Two persons were injured this morning in a collision of automobiles, one driven by Governor John H. Trumbull's personal chauffeur, and having John Coolidge, son of President Coolidge, as a passenger, and the other driven by Wilfred Veno, who had his mother, Mrs. Mary Veno, with him. The Venos are in the hospital, Mrs. Veno with lacerations about the face and bruises on the body and her son with a possible skull fracture.

Coolidge and the chauffeur were unhurt.

PLAINVILLE, Conn., Sept. 27.—(AP) Mrs. Catharine Coolidge, wife of the president, was an overnight guest at the home of Governor and Mrs. John H. Trumbull here. Her son, John, came up from New Haven and also was a guest.

Mrs. Coolidge returned this morning to Northampton, Mass., where she is spending a few days near her mother who is ill, and John was taken to New Haven by the governor's chauffeur.

John is a junior clerk in the office of the general manager of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, and this morning he was a little late reaching his desk, a matter of routine in which he has shown punctuality since he took up his duties.

## Another Oregon Man Is Mistaken for Deer; Is Shot and Killed

LA GRANDE, Ore., Sept. 27.—(AP) Leonard Olson of Lostine, 8 miles west of La Grande, was killed last night in a hunting accident. He was hit by a bullet fired by a group of three hunters who mistook him for a deer.

## MRS. WILLEBRANDT HITS BACK HARD AT BOURBON ATTACKERS

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—(AP) Congressman Walter Newton of Minnesota, in charge of the republican speakers' bureau, declared today that Mrs. Mabel Willebrandt, sponsored by the republican national committee for her campaign address, and added that "my only regret is that Mrs. Willebrandt cannot give more of her time to the campaign."

His statement was made in an interview with newsmen in which Mrs. Willebrandt, particularly when she called at western republican campaign headquarters, Mrs. Willebrandt, whose recent utterances against the candidacy of Governor Alfred E. Smith for president have aroused criticism on the ground that she had tried to inject religious prejudice into the campaign, vehemently denied such charges in her talk with reporters.

"There is nothing in a single speech or utterance of mine," she declared, "either public or private, that could with the slightest degree of fairness be twisted into a construction of arousing religious prejudice, or an abuse of Mr. Smith or anybody else on the ground of religion."

"It is Mr. Smith himself who is trying to dodge behind his own church. I personally have too high respect for the Catholics with whom I have worked out to be sorry to see a prominent Catholic like Mr. Smith attempt to create a belief in the public mind that criticism directed to him by the press and by people opposed to Tammany is aimed at his church."

She said the prohibition was a moral and not a political issue in the campaign, and declared that Mr. Smith and not the democratic or republican party had injected it into the campaign.

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—(AP) Two small sons of a Chicago banker were missing today from the Tooth school at Woodstock, Ill., a private academy.

The boys, who disappeared following the noon recess yesterday, were Robert Spring, 11, and Joseph, 8.

Police were notified by school authorities and a search of surrounding counties was begun at once.

The boys' father, Benjamin J. Spring, president of a Chicago finance corporation, said he had received no kidnapping threats. He, however, did not believe the boys had run away, because no clothes had been taken from their rooms.

The mother of the boys, who has remarried since her divorce from Mr. Spring, said she had no knowledge of their whereabouts.

She believes he may have been robbed and said he was fond of gambling and fears some of his friends may have learned he carried the money and jewelry and had stolen it.

## DRY AGENTS FIRE ON FLEEING CAR, GIRL NEAR DEATH

LORAIN, Ohio, Sept. 27.—(AP) Miss Betty Heywood, 22, of Elyria, is in a serious condition in a hospital here from a bullet wound alleged to have been received when federal prohibition officers working under the direction of Mayor J. C. Standen fired on a car in which she was riding early today at South Lorain.

The prohibition officers alleged to have done the shooting are in jail.

The officers, Frank Klady, Walter Knitter and Louis Cicco, all of Standen.

No liquor was found in the car. Klady was a deputy sheriff. Knitter and Cicco are city police. All three are charged with a dry enforcement squad under Mayor Standen.

Lorain, are held on technical charges for investigation.

The shooting occurred at a bridge in South Lorain where the dry agents were stationed to apprehend rum runners. They are alleged to have fired on the car in which Miss Heywood was a passenger when it did not stop on command.

Charles Edwards of Elyria, driver of the car in which his wife, infant daughter and Miss Heywood were passengers, said he believed the agents were holdup men and increased the car's speed when they ordered him to stop, and as the car sped east, one shot was fired, striking Miss Heywood in the neck.

Edwards drove to a hospital, where he left Miss Heywood and then reported the matter to the police.

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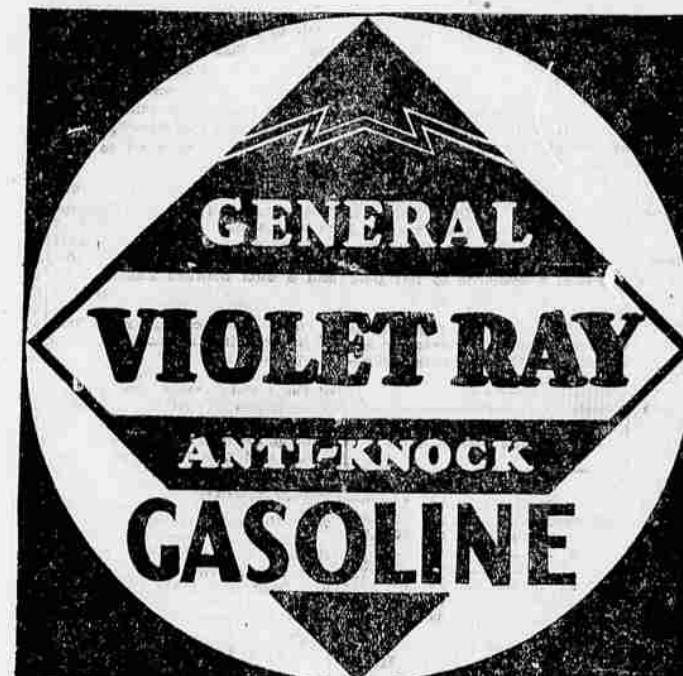
