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ROGUE RIVER MAN STARTS A ROD AND GUN CLUB VENTURE

ROGUE RIVER, Sept. 26.—T. Baker who has resided here for the past year is busy these days in organizing a rod and gun club which will have exclusive rights over a 3000 acre hunting ground, situated in Shasta county, Calif., on the Weed-Klamath Falls highway and the Southern Pacific railway in full view of Mt. Shasta.

According to present plans the lake, mountains, meadow and marsh land will be fenced with a three-foot game fence and stocked with noble deer and elk. The lake is said to be teeming with fish including rainbow trout, brook trout and others. Approximately 1000 acres of the marsh will be seeded to wild rice, wild celery, pond lilies and water hyacinth.

A modern club house will be built for the convenience of the members, the number being limited to 25, Mr. Baker estimated.

Each member will have a deed to a summer home on the lake shore and have free access to the entire 3000 acres at all times.
