Science

The American Chemistry society is sponsoring an essay contest in which all high school students are eligible. The essay is to contain not more than 2500 words. Those entering the contest will have six subjects to choose from, namely: First—The Relation of Chemistry to Health and Disease. Second—The Relation of Chemistry to Enrichment of Life. Third—The Relation of Chemistry to Agriculture and Forestry. Fourth—The Relation of Chemistry to National Defense. Fifth—The Relation of Chemistry to the Home.

Sixth—The Relation of Chemistry to Development of an Industry, or a Resource of the United States.

The prizes will be awarded by Mr. and Mrs. Francis P. Garvan, who have made this contest possible for five previous years.

There will be a prize of \$20 awarded in each state for first prize and honorable mention for second. The winner of the national contest automatically enters the national contest. The winner of the national contest receives a scholarship for four years to a standard college or university and a \$500 fee for the four years at college or university.

The local contest will be in charge of H. P. Coye, chemistry instructor at the high school.

In 1927 Miss Ellen Williams won first prize in the state contest. This was the first time that Medford high had had a winner in these contests, although entries had been made every year.
