AUTOISTS CLAIM MAN THREW ROCK AT PASSING CAR

"I've worn out better balls than this," was the first remark said to have been passed by Bill Green, charged with serious disturbances to tourists on the highway in the Siskiyou mountains, when he was brought into the county jail by Sheriff Jennings yesterday afternoon.

Green, who is said to have thrown a rock at one auto and to have placed a plank and rocks across the road to stop traffic on the highway, denies the charges. James Ayleworth of Klamath Falls and Charles Trimmer of Yreka are among the witnesses who claim to have seen the deliberate attempts of the accused.

This morning Green who admitted having served sentence for robbery in Salt Lake, said that he was put off a freight train above Siskiyou. He complained that his blankets had been stolen from the edge of the highway where he had left them to get a drink at a near-by ranch house. He said he knew absolutely nothing about the charges of disturbance brought against him.
