

INSTITUTE CLASS ON OCCUPATIONS AT HIGH SCHOOL

An occupation class, long the dream of Superintendent E. H. Hurd, is among the new courses offered at the local high school this year. This course will concern facts having to do with the various occupations in the business and industrial field, which are open to students upon graduation from the high school.

No text books will be used in the course, but the students will be required to gather their material from technical journals, statistics as compiled by the chamber of commerce and government bureaus.

During the year, more than 20 students have signed up for this study.

The body was headless and badly broken. It was the fourth body of the seven in the plane to be found. The plane itself has never been located.
