

MEDFORD TEACHER TELLS OF CONTEST HELD FOR TYPISTS

Albert Tangora, formerly world typing champion for three years, again received the title at the international typing contest held at Sacramento at the Memorial Auditorium at 8 p. m. Saturday, September 29.

Tangora won in the professional class, writing an average of 132 words per minute for an hour, with 47 errors. George Hasfield took second place, with 42 errors and 121 words per minute. Harry Stapert, known as the "dark horse," because of the fact that he had been runner-up several times, took third place with 29 errors, and 129 words per minute. There were five entries in the professional class.

The amateur class, which had 15 entries, wrote for a half hour. Those winning in this class were: Irma Wright of Canada, who made 29 errors and an average of 114 words per minute. She also received the cup awarded by Governor Young of California. Others winning in class 2 are as follows: Chester Soucek, of Pennsylvania, with 22 errors, and an average of 111; Lucy Hardin, of Canada, 148 words per minute; Louise Marchese, of Sacramento, and Florence Abeggelen with 4 errors and 106 words per minute.

The novice class wrote for 15 minutes. There were entries from each state in the union, and 19 other entries. The winners were: Wilma McBride of Canada, first place in this division with 17 errors and 87 words per minute. Second place, Anna Safer, Jacksonville, Florida, with 9 errors, 82 words per minute. Miss Safer also won the cup awarded by Governor Smith of New York. Miss McBride could not receive the cup, as it was to be awarded to some one in the United States. Other winners were: Hazel Ruetter, Norfolk, Neb., third, 13 mistakes, 82 words per minute. Miss Ruetter also won the one-minute contest, writing 162 words, with one error. Beth Beal of Richmond, Utah, fourth place with 12 errors, and an average of 81 words per minute. Chester Soucek, winner of second place in the amateur class, was winner of first prize in the novice division last year.

With only seven entries from Canada, they were able to walk away with four prizes, one of them being a large cup. Miss Florence Abeggelen had the least number of errors of any in the contest. She was winner of fifth place in the amateur division. The international typing contest seemed to be quite an attraction to movie companies, as there were seven represented, taking pictures of the contestants, who all typed together, regardless of class they were entered in. Movie camera machines were also recording at the contest.

Mrs. Elizabeth Jerome, typing instructor at the local school, returned Monday from the contest. She was privileged to be awarded an official badge by J. N. Kimball, manager of the contest. There was but one other badge awarded to Oregon representatives. This is the first year the typing contest was held outside of New York.

From far-off Italy comes a comedy with the most liberal allowance in modern vaudeville of regular recitation of the day together with several of the standard classics.

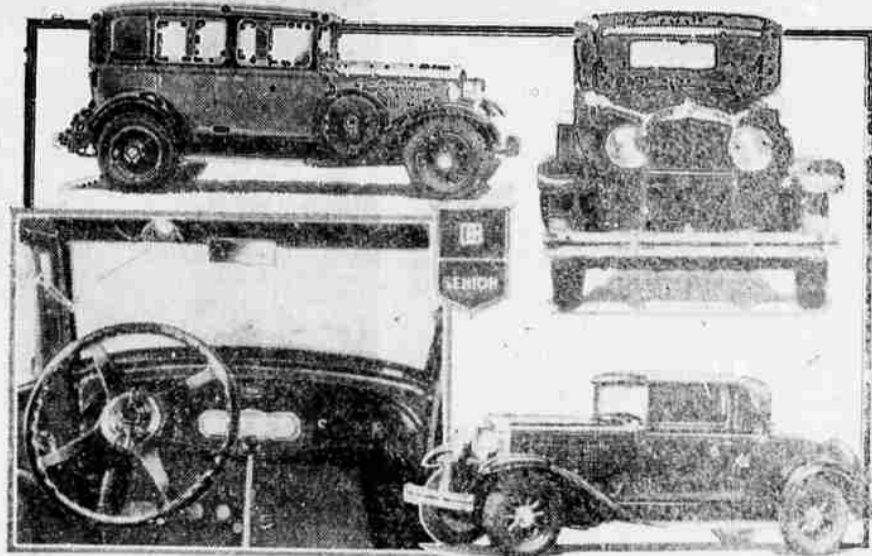
