New York state Democratic convention, waiting for Governor Smith returning to select candidates, waited wisely. Governor Smith chose as candidate for governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, liked and respected by all that know him. For lieutenant governor, Governor Smith chose Colonel Herbert H. Lehman, very able business man, whose unlimited capacity for hard work would enable him, if necessary, to relieve Mr. Roosevelt, whose health is bad. These nominations add strength to the Democratic ticket. Republicans will realize it and work the harder.

New York City has 6,917,500 population. A good-sized city like that, in a short time, will change to 20,000,000. Experts show that before the century ends New York and 50 miles of territory around it will have 50,000,000 population, more than all of Great Britain or France.

Machinery, science and intensive cultivation eliminate worry about over-population. Some day, New York, where the United States spends its money, will have a real estate boom worth talking about. Land that now sells for \$300 a square foot, will sell for \$1000, and be cheap at that price.

Germany celebrated Monday the eighty-first birthday of Paul Von Hindenburg, a great leader and fighter in the war, although he had retired as an old man when the war started.

Von Hindenburg has shown himself a capable, powerful, loyal president of the German republic. A nation is to be envied that can produce such statesmen and fighters as Von Stein, Frederick the Great and Hindenburg.

Trotzky, dying of malaria and consumption in Turkestan, exiled by his soviet associates, is too proud to ask for mercy of those that got rid of him. Stalin, now ruling Russia, will not let Trotzky return.

Fortunate Lenin, who died in time and lies embalmed under glass, for Russia to revere him. If he were living he might be with Trotzky, philosophizing on the gratitude of revolution. Alcoholic drinks under prohibition are various. In the south "white wine," powerful alcohol made of corn, is popular. In the middle west "needing" beer is drunk by workmen. It is "legal" beer, originally containing no alcohol, but brought up to a highly alcoholic percentage by "needing" it with alcohol, procured by redistilling degenerated alcohol bought at gasoline stations. New York speakeasies, surrounding newspaper and other plants, sell "smoke," a deadly alcohol with a little ether added to give the cloudy, "smoke" effect. This drink is well described as follows: "Three shots and you know nothing until next day."

He is ready to question the Republican presidential nominee and that President Coolidge would deliver some addresses before election day but he did not know whether they would be political or not.

## Liquor Board Edict Makes Artillerymen Stage a Dry Party

TORONTO, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Members of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts were unable to drink toast to the king and the president in port wine last night. Sir Henry Drayton, chairman of the Ontario liquor control board, which has charge of the sale of liquor in government stores, originally had decided to give permission for the use of wine at a banquet to be tendered the visitors by local officials. Later after a conference between Sir Henry and members of the provincial government, the permission was withdrawn.

## NO HOOVER FARM PLAN SAYS SMITH

Democratic Leader Scoffs Yoakum Approval of Hoover's Stand—Tariff Only Farm Solution By Opponent Is Claim—No Machinery for Self-Help.

Yoakum, former national president, had approved Hoover's farm relief plan, Governor Smith said today: "I cannot for the life of me see where Mr. Yoakum can claim that Mr. Hoover has any plan."

The governor said that no matter how high the tariff was driven on wheat, "if we have an exportable surplus and we are compelled to sell the whole crop at the price of the surplus, the tariff cannot operate. That is not a new principle."

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Payments of \$11,000 a week to disorderly houses in one police district have been uncovered by District Attorney Monaghan, who is conducting a grand jury investigation of rum runners and gamblers' activities.

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DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 3.—(AP)—William Gibbs, 26, of Los Angeles, who robbed a Canadian National railway mail car of amounts variously estimated at between \$22,000 and \$30,000, was being held in Windsor, Ont., today after furnishing authorities with a criminal narrative without parallel in this section.

Gibbs boarded the train at Chatham, Ont., and, gaining access to the mail car, held three messengers at bay with a pistol while he looted the registered bags, then as the train slowed down for a stop at Prairie siding, dropped from the mail car but rebounded the rear coach of the train.

ROME, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Surrounded by a little group of intimate friends and in the greatest simplicity, Gene Tunney, retired heavyweight champion, and Miss Mary Josephine Lauder, of Greenwich, Conn., were married today at the Hotel Rissio.

Two halves of the "royal apartment" normally reserved for visiting sovereigns were made one for the civil ceremony which was performed by Signor Brofferio, a leading Fascist, and the other for the religious ceremony performed by Monsignor Joseph A. Breslin of the American college in Rome and one-time parish priest of the Tunney family in New York.

## ODDS FALL FIVE-THREE FOR CARDS

Crippled Yankees Given Small Chance in Series—Some Fans See Hospital List As Pre-Series Alibi—Cards Practice in Grim Earnest.
