## OREGON PREPARES FOR AIR ATTACK SATURDAY GAME

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 3.—(AP)—In anticipation that Pop Warner and his Stanford Cardinals will attempt to bombard his team with passes, Captain John J. McEwan, Oregon coach, will spend the rest of the week before the Stanford game here Saturday in teaching his players the methods of solving the tricky aerial attack. If Oregon can stop the passes, the Webfoot coach is confident the team will more than hold its own against the Cards, as Oregon has its strongest forward wall in years.

The game will be the opening conference tilt for both, and promises to be the battle of the air, as Oregon is spending no little time in mastering the art of passing. Healthier than Stanford possesses one of the strongest lines in the conference the Webfoot coach plans to use a series of passes sandwiched in his line plays.

Despite Oregon's fine showing against Pacific, the champion Cards are still 13-point favorites. The odds have shrunk in a week from 21 to 13 and if it continues to rain as it did yesterday they may be even less when the starting whistle blows.

## 'POP' CONTINUES POLISHING TEAM

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, CAL., Oct. 3.—(AP)—Coach "Pop" Warner continued to polish off the rough edges in the team play of the Stanford varsity football eleven today in preparation for the opening game of the coast conference season, scheduled Saturday in Eugene against the University of Oregon.

Warner laid great stress upon development of an aerial attack. It appeared certain today that three regulars, Bob Sims, halfback, and Fentrip, fullback, and "Ting" Post, guard, would not be able to start against the Webfooters. Sims is nursing a severe shoulder injury, Fentrip only recently discarded crutches after a leg injury, and Post is suffering from a back injury.

## ACE HUDKINS IS BADLY BEATEN IN 10-ROUND BOUT IN COAST LEAGUE

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Whatever chance Ace Hudkins had of again meeting Mickey Walker, middleweight champion, has gone glimmering. And Joe Anderson, the Kentuckian, takes his place as Walker's foremost challenger.

So opened the fighters at last night's hard fought 10-round battle between the Nebraska Wildcat and the "Blue Grass" middleweight. The decision went to Anderson along with at least six rounds.

Anderson beat Hudkins at his own game. He bested the Nebraska at his greatest forte—in fighting—and did it with such decisiveness that the outcome was little in doubt. The Ace, stung and with fire aroused, after coming out second best in the early part of the third, sprang into furious action, battering the Kentuckian with terrific rights and lefts to the ropes. He continued his flailing through the fourth.

Anderson changed to Hudkins' style in the fifth and willingly met the Nebraska at close quarters to take the session. Hudkins tried to box with Anderson and found himself easy picking for the clever Kentuckian.

The tenth was the most furious of the rounds, with a raging "Wildcat" seeking to claw his way to victory, but Anderson in the earlier rounds had chalked up too great an advantage to be overcome.

## DUNNE DECISION DISAPPOINTMENT FOR E. E. GATES

BAKER, Ore., Oct. 3.—(AP)—Keen disappointment was expressed by E. E. "Pop" Gates, member of the highway commission, and Roy A. Klein, engineer and secretary of the commission, when they arrived in Baker last night from central Oregon and heard the news of the Oregon supreme court decision affirming the decision of the Marion county circuit court in refusing to enjoin the secretary of state from placing the Dunne auto license reduction bill on the November ballot.

"It means a setback in the highway program of more than six months, even if the bill is defeated at the election and a delay in the letting of more than \$2,000,000 in contracts in highway construction," Mr. Gates declared.

"We think the great majority of people are friendly to a continuation of the present highway commission program, but we cannot take a chance and release these construction contracts only to find that we have not the money to meet them if the Dunne bill should pass," said Mr. Klein.
