

LIBRARY REFUND BEING WORKED ON BY COUNTY COURT

The county court and assessor's office are working out the amount of refund which will be paid the Ashland library, who Wednesday filed a request on the ground that the Medford library had failed to service seven districts adjacent to Ashland. The districts are Nell Creek, Dead Indian, Bellevue, Pilot Rock, Pinehurst and Celestin.

In 1927 the seven districts voted to consolidate with the Ashland Library district, but the consolidation, under the law is not effective until next year. They had previously been served through the Medford library, Ashland having its own special library levy of two mills.

The Medford library immediately concluded that they were no longer bound to service the districts, and withdrew it, and the work was taken up by the Ashland library.

The Medford library, as soon as the discrepancy was explained to them, speedily acquiesced to the refund, and County Judge Sawyer this morning congratulated all concerned upon the amicable adjustment of the controversy.

REWARD OFFERED FOR DOG POISONER

During the past few days a number of dogs have been poisoned in three different sections of the city. Four were poisoned in the district between Eighth and Eleventh streets and Grape and Ivy. It is distinctly known that in one instance poisoned meat was thrown into the yard of the parties owning the dog.

It is claimed there is a clue to the person who put out this poison gained through letters written the owners of dogs and an arrest may result. There is a heavy fine or jail sentence for conviction of poisoning dogs or other domestic animals.

Poison thrown out in this careless and malicious way might also be picked up and eaten by children with fatal results.

The Jackson County Humane society is offering \$100 reward for arrest and conviction of anyone poisoning dogs.

The boy Scouts are putting up the reward cards over the city.

SNOW IS FALLING AT CRATER LAKE; MORE EXPECTED

It has been snowing hard at Crater national park for the past three days and when he left the park last night for Medford it was still snowing and the depth of snow at the rim then amounted to nine inches, with the barometer still falling, which indicated a continuation of the storm in that section, stated Superintendent C. G. Thompson of Crater national park, who spent today in this city.

Superintendent Thompson further stated that all road and a full construction work for the year had ceased in the park, but that maintenance work would be continued by small crews as long as the weather permitted. Full details, outside the present snow storm, of affairs at the park are contained in the official Crater National Park bulletin of October 1, published elsewhere in this paper.

When the storm passes the snow it is expected will soon melt away.

MAYOR CANDIDATE GIVES STATEMENT FOR CITY VOTERS

To the Editor:
In accepting the candidacy for mayor of the city of Medford I recognize two cardinal facts—the first of which is that I am a comparatively new man in the Rogue River valley, and am not personally acquainted with all nor even a majority of the people. Second, I recognize that the voters have a right and should demand to know something about every candidate up for public office. The more intimately acquainted the electorate is with each candidate before election, and what he or she stands for, the better government we will have in our community, state and nation; for in the final analysis we can depend upon the verdict of the people being right in the great majority of cases. All men and women in this community and in this great nation who are old enough, owe it to their own well being and to the best interests of our homes and our public institutions to go to the polls on November 4 and exercise their franchise, which is one of the sacred gifts of our government. Likewise we all owe a service in some way and at some time in life, either to hold office or render some public service.

I have never been an office seeker, and I am not now seeking public office beyond the degree of having consented to allow my name

before the people of Medford as a candidate for mayor. Beyond this I shall make no active campaign. I have no political ambition to satisfy, no political debts to pay. I desire to court no favors from any selfish group of citizens. Therefore I am not anxious to take on the burdens and responsibilities of the mayor's office unless the command comes from the people whom I must serve. If that command comes I shall give the best there is in me.

I am happy in "This Great Country" to live a quiet life. Fishing is very good.

I have lived in Medford a little more than two years and I am closing out my financial interests in other sections and investing in Medford and the Rogue River valley, and I expect to continue this program with the view of making this my permanent home. I am therefore vitally interested in the future development of Medford and this great empire, believing as I do that the future of Medford and the Rogue River valley hold more in store for us than most of us realize or even hope for. We should therefore take a forward look and plan wisely for the future.

Our city government and the people should be in harmony in a program of street and all civic development, always conservative in the expenditure of public funds, but aggressive in the building up and improvement of our civic interests; our parks and our street and road system as rapidly as it is possible to do with the funds available without too much burden upon the taxpayers; for through no other means save that of industry can we build a populous community, and new industry is always attracted to a city well equipped with streets to handle the ever increasing congestion of traffic.

Medford is fortunate indeed in having a wide awake Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis, Rotary and Lions service clubs, all of which are made up of real business men, the best business men of the community; and the Greater Medford club, composed of women of vision, ever ready to sponsor community interests of merit. Such organizations as these are of inestimable value in the administrative affairs of a growing city, such as ours, and to these organizations much credit is due for the forward step Medford has taken in recent years.

Law enforcement is another matter which goes a long way in attracting new people or driving them from us. If I am elected mayor it will be my policy as head of the city government to see to it that law enforcement is administered in a vigorous, intelligent, yes—common-sense manner.

I have had no training along political lines. If I possess any qualifications which would recommend me to the office of Mayor, they are of a business character and not political, for my life has been devoted entirely to business. Respectfully,
