FEHL CANDIDACY INJECTS INTEREST MAYORALTY RACE

The local mayoralty campaign, in which there are only two candidates—A. W. Pipes, the candidate of the business men's association, and Earl H. Fehl, the perennial mayoralty candidate, who each year has announced that he would be on running for the office until elected—will not lack in color or pep, because of any modesty on Mr. Fehl's part in putting forth his claims before the voters.

Today a small pamphlet, prepared by Mr. Fehl and setting forth his views on how the various departments of the city should be conducted, and pledging a faithful performance of duty if he is elected, was delivered in every home in Medford by hand-to-hand distribution.

"I confidently await your verdict on the 6th day of November," is the last sentence in the pamphlet, which is signed by Mr. Fehl.

In addition, the independent candidate for mayor is now completing arrangements to further augment his candidatorial claims, by broadcasting them in one or two speeches over the local radio station during his active campaign.

The management of the KMED station, in the preliminary negotiations, which are still on, made it plain to Mr. Fehl that his radio speeches must be of a constructive nature, and free from all personalities. He agreed to this and further, it is said, agreed to submit a copy of each radio speech to the management for censorship, if it was felt that such was needed.

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MERCHANTS GIVE RADIO TIME FOR BASEBALL SERIES

Scores of southern Oregon baseball fans listened in this morning to the Mail-Tribune's broadcast of the first game of the world's series baseball games. The second game of the series will be broadcast tomorrow, starting about ten o'clock local time.

Through the courtesy of various business houses, which had contracted for time over KMED, their time was granted to this paper for the baseball broadcast, as was that of the Groceries, Ed Hines and Javulin & Woods for the remaining games.

HUGH HANKIN IS DEFENSE WITNESS IN FEDERAL CASE

The jury in the Jack Martin case was still deliberating at 4:00 o'clock this afternoon.

The case of Jack Smith, Fort Klamath hotel operator, charged on seven counts with violation of the sale and possession clause of the prohibition law and maintaining a nuisance, was given to the jury at 2:45 o'clock this afternoon.

District Attorney George Neuner made the closing address for the government.

"One reason why the government cannot convict the higher-up is because the defense brings in underlings to commit perjury and save the dirty pelt of the defendants," he was referring to Hankin, who assumed all blame for the liquor sale, and was described by the fiery prosecutor as "a spineless cactus" and "a brainless wonder."

The court, in its instructions to the jury, said "that no matter what their personal opinion of the prohibition law might be, they were to be guided solely by the evidence as adduced from the witness stand," and "you are not acting as a legislative body to modify or change the law."

Hugh Hankin, a logger, self-admitted bootlegger, who was sentenced to sixty days, upon his plea of guilty before Federal Judge John McNary at Portland, was the star witness for the defense this morning. In the trial of Jack Martin, of Klamath Falls, barber, hotel and restaurant keeper, charged with sale and possession of liquor. The case is being heard before Federal Judge Robert S. Hoar, holding the court session for the southern Oregon district.

Hankin, who jointly indicted with Martin, took all the blame for the sale of a bottle of moonshine to a group of prohibition enforcement agents headed by Earl R. Keller of Seattle, Wash., last June. The witness denied that when sentence was passed upon him by Federal Judge McNary, he made a statement that he was "helping out Martin in his liquor business for his room and board," and clung to his story, despite the warning from the court and District Attorney George Neuner, that he was laying himself open to charges of perjury.

Hankin declared that the home-made beer, special agents testified Martin had sold them along with sandwiches on a hot day, was a gift from himself. He said the agents represented themselves as "big liquor men from California," and he wanted to curry favor.

The witness at first refused to tell who sold him the moonshine, while he kept echoed "on the river," despite questioning by District Attorney Neuner.

"I don't care to answer that question," was his reply.

"It don't make any difference what you care to answer," said the court. "You are under oath."

Hankin then reluctantly testified that he had purchased the moonshine from a W. A. Congo of Klamath Falls, now, the district attorney remarked, serving a sentence for bootleg operations.

The home-made beer, Hankin testified, he purchased from a man by the name of Arch Wimer.

Special Agent Godfrey denied that he had told Martin that he was a representative of "liquor wholesalers," who intended to operate in southern Oregon, with autos equipped with machine guns.

The government witnesses, who included Ralph Kelly, now a deputy sheriff of Washington county, Oregon, testified that Martin sold moonshine by the glass in his place.

In the trial of Cal Callender and Gus Hirschberger of Chiloquin, Oregon charged with sale and possession, a federal jury returned a verdict of guilty on two counts of the indictment. Hirschberger assumed the blame in the case.

Hoover Continues to Lead Al Smith in Literary Digest Poll

THE LITERARY DIGEST poll, now totaling nearly 500,000, continues to forecast a sweeping victory for Mr. Hoover in the electoral college. In fact, the figures, from a Republican standpoint, are almost too good to be true.

Twenty states are now listed, and the only state carried thus far by Smith is Arkansas, the home state of his running mate, Senator Robinson, and even there the vote is Hoover 1800, Smith 1555.

True, no other Southern state is included, but five Northern states which Brother Raskob has from the first claimed certain for Al, are not only for Hoover, but overwhelmingly for him.

Here are the figures:

New York City is not included in the poll, and until it is the straw ballot in that state is valueless, as far as throwing any definite light upon how that state is going in November. However, if the rural districts continue to go for Hoover 2½ to 1, Smith can't be sure of even winning his own state in November.

If we didn't know that heretofore the Digest poll had been amazingly accurate, and that its publisher is a strong Smith supporter, we would be inclined to believe there was something "phony" about the entire affair. But under the circumstances we fail to see how any impartial observer can deny that the vote THIS FALL points not only to a certain Republican victory, but an overwhelming one.

The Digest stresses Democratic consolidation in the fact that over 100,000 Republicans are voting for Smith and less than 55,000 Democrats for Hoover.

Just where the consolation comes in we fail to grasp. For the significant point is not how many Republicans are for Smith and Democrats for Hoover, but how the two major parties themselves are splitting.

At the last presidential election, for example, the total Republican vote in round numbers was 15,000,000 and the Democratic 8,900,000. Now, according to the present Digest poll, Hoover is keeping nearly 80 per cent of that Republican total and Smith is keeping considerably less than 60 per cent of the Democratic total.

In other words, if this proportion is continued, and is followed out by the action of the voters in November, the respective popular votes of these two candidates will be approximately:

Hoover	12,400,000
Smith	7,800,000

But how about the LaFollette vote last year? It is this vote added to the 1924 Democratic vote upon which the sanguine Mr. Raskob has based his landslide for Al.

LaFollette, four years ago, is listed by the World Almanac as Independent, Progressive and Socialist. The only way to get an indication of how this vote is going this year is to add up the Socialist and Farm-Labor columns, for the LaFollette strength must either be here, or already distributed in the Hoover and Smith columns.

This LaFollette vote stands:

Hoover	3,715
Smith	6,081

LaFollette polled nearly 5,000,000 votes in 1924, and giving Smith two-thirds of this vote and Hoover one-third the totals stand, in round figures:

Hoover	18,000,000
Smith	14,000,000

But these figures entirely disregard the new voters, and those who did not vote four years ago, undeniably an important factor in the present election. The Digest figures show "no voters" are going to Hoover in practically the same proportion as the old voters:

Hoover	75,000
Smith	39,207

We have never thought—and we don't think now,—this election is to be a Hoover walkaway. But we do believe that as things in the country stand today, not only as indicated by this poll but by all other polls, and all other signs, including the result in Maine,—Hoover is at the present time as certain to be the next President of the United States as he is of casting his vote in November,—and those who care to analyze that statement will see that it isn't as extravagantly optimistic as it sounds. For something MAY prevent Hoover from casting his vote in Palo Alto just as something MAY divert the present political currents in another direction.

In fact, we know one enthusiastic Smith supporter in Jackson County who will read these same figures and prove to his own satisfaction that the result will be a Smith landslide.

Is he right? Are we wrong? Well, dope it out for yourself,—here are the figures:

MORE MAIL NOW, BUT LESS MONEY IN POSTOFFICE

Despite the fact that more general postage business was actually done at the Medford postoffice during the month of September, during which the mails were heavier than September of last year, for the first time in many years there was a monthly loss last month in receipts, over the receipts of the same month a year ago. The total receipts for last month were \$671.79, as against the receipts of \$697.19 for September a year ago, making a decrease of between 5 and 8 per cent.

However, Medford is not distinctive in this regard, as all postoffices in the United States showed similar decreases due to the lower postage rates on third class printed matter, such as circulars, and the 4th class matter, including parcel post, having gone into effect last July. Besides, September this year had one business day less than September of last year. The Medford postoffice staff is just coming out of an exceptionally heavy grind, caused by the unusually heavy first of the month business that always results when the last day of the previous month falls on Sunday and the first day of the incoming month on Monday.
