

IODIZED MILK SUPPLY GIVEN TO SCIENTISTS

Mrs. McCormick Presents Holstein Herd for Goitre Cure—Cows Fed Sea-weed—Milk Contains 306 Parts Iodine in Million.

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick's Holstein herd, one of the finest in the mid-west has been turned over to science, seeking a preventative and cure for common goitre.

Since July 1 at this herd of Mrs. McCormick, Republican nominee for congresswoman-at-large, has been the subject of experiments conducted under the direction of Prof. George W. Cavanaugh, head of the department of chemistry at Cornell university.

By feeding powdered seaweed to the cows the scientists have produced milk with an iodine content sufficient to serve as a preventative and possibly as a cure for goitre, Prof. Cavanaugh announced.

Prior to the tests the milk from the McCormick herd was free of iodine. After the experiment had progressed several weeks the milk was found to contain 306 parts of iodine in a million.

The seaweed was mixed with regular feed. Samples of the iodized milk were found to retain their flavor and food quality. The iodine content was said to be more than sufficient doctors declaring that a minimum of from 150 to 200 parts of iodine in a million is necessary to make milk effective as a goitre preventive.

At the office of the journal of the American Medical association the tests were described as constituting "a most interesting experiment, potentially of considerable value in the Lake Michigan region where water and soil are deficient in iodine content."

Mrs. McCormick, daughter of Mark Hanna, "maker of presidents," has one of the show places of the Illinois countryside in her Rock River farm, where the iodized milk experiments have been conducted. She offered her herd for the tests when scientists expressed a preference for conducting the experiments in the heart of what physicians have called the "goitre belt."

NORTHCOTT IN CANADA CELL GERMAN BLIMP BEGINS FLIGHT MORE NERVOUS NEXT SUNDAY

Letter From Sister Hoping Northcotts Can 'Make Peace With God' Shakes Prisoner—New Evidence Found—Mrs. Northcott Heavily Insured.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 4.—(AP)—A sister who looked on the tales of murder related by her own son as incriminating Gordon Stewart Northcott and his mother, today was reported to be the author of a letter expressing the "hope that brother and mother can make their peace with God." The letter, written by Mrs. Winifred Clark at Calgary, Alberta, Canada, was supposed to have been addressed to her sister, Jessie Clark at Vancouver, B. C., where Northcott is held.

Mrs. Clark's expression, interpreted as doubt of her brother's innocence after she already had gone to his defense, was repeated to the 31 year old chicken ranch proprietor. Reports from his cell indicated that the news of his sister's declaration combined with the effect of solitary confinement had disheartened him and apparently made him unusually nervous.

Much of his cool demeanor had vanished, reports said, but whether his new attitude was natural or an attempt to feign approaching insanity was unknown. He has been in prison for 16 days.

The circuitous legal trail that Northcott and his mother, Mrs. Sarah Louisa Northcott, held at Calgary, must tread in their announced fight to escape a conviction of murder charges was lengthened here yesterday by another murder indictment. It charged Northcott with the slaying of a Mexican youth, whose neighbors said he had associated with at his father's home here and whose headless body was found near Puento, Cal.

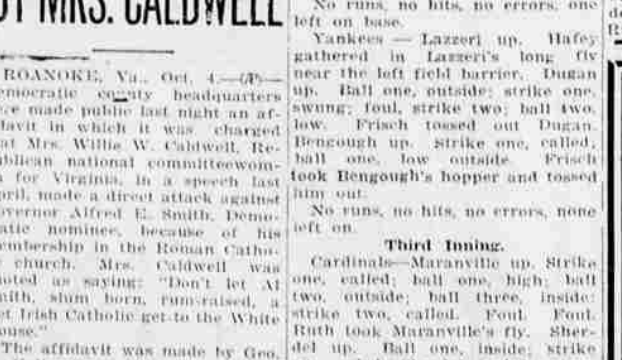
To the mass of circumstantial evidence of letters, bloodstains, bone and hair which police have accumulated since their investigations began they added two other discoveries yesterday which they believed of prime importance.

One was the finding of a boy, who police said, had been held captive on the Winifred ranch. Authorities, although declining to reveal his identity, momentarily expected a statement from him that was predicted would be of great value in strengthening their case against the Northcotts.

The second discovery consisted of two letters alleged to have been written by Northcott and his mother. One was said to have revealed that the pair were aware of the charges against them and the second was reported to have told that Mrs. Northcott had insured her life for \$5000 to be used in defense of her son if he were captured.

AFFIDAVIT CLAIMS AL SMITH ATTACK BY MRS. CALDWELL

ROANOKE, Va., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Democratic county headquarters here made public last night an affidavit in which it was charged that Mrs. Willie W. Caldwell, Republican national convention agent for Virginia, in a speech last April, made a direct attack against Governor Alfred E. Smith, Democratic nominee, because of his membership in the Roman Catholic church. Mrs. Caldwell's affidavit was signed by Geo. V. Kelly, Tazewell county cattle raiser and said Mrs. Caldwell's speech was delivered at Tazewell, Va., April 21, 1928. Another affidavit made by W. B. Leslie, publisher of the Clinch Valley News, said that he had read Kelly's affidavit and that he believed "the same to be substantially correct."



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GERMAN BLIMP BEGINS FLIGHT MORE NERVOUS NEXT SUNDAY

Tests and Is Set for Hop to America—Only Bad Weather Will Stop Attempt to Span Atlantic.

BERLIN, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The new German dirigible Graf Zeppelin, having made her final test flight flawlessly, is ready to leave for the United States on Sunday. It was announced that only unfavorable weather would delay the airship's departure.

The Graf Zeppelin on the test flight of 34 1/2 hours, covered about 1800 miles at an average speed of more than 52 miles an hour. The ship flew from Friedrichshafen, where it was built, over Holland to England, and over cruising over Germany, back to its base.

As a rehearsal for the trans-Atlantic flight, the airship was navigated throughout the night exclusively by instruments in the pilot's cage, which was isolated from the chart room behind it.

The dirigible was stated to have shown no warning or other indications of contour shifting or inflation gas. This is always considered possible in a new airship of such dimensions, especially when it encounters strong head winds.

The motors functioned flawlessly throughout the trip. An experiment of running all 12 of them simultaneously on the new, developed "blue gas," named after the inventor, was successful. For the greater part of the flight, however, benzene was used so as to conserve the lighter fuel for the flight to America.

Sixty-nine persons, including the crew, accompanied Dr. Hugo Eckener, builder of the Graf Zeppelin, officially known as LZ-127. One of the guests of the flight was Lieutenant Commander Charles E. Rosendahl, U. S. navy, commander of the dirigible Los Angeles, originally the LZ-126, which was also built at Friedrichshafen.

FLIES SAIL COPEHAGEN, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Bert Hassell and Parker Greiner, American flyers who were rescued in Greenland, sailed for America today as guests of the Scandinavian American line. Before leaving they reiterated that they desired to make another attempt to fly the Atlantic next year.
