FOOTBALL VICTORY LIGHT SCRIMMAGE MARRINER FIGHTS TUNNEY AND BRIDE THRILLS KLAMATH; IS TROJAN TAPER WITH BROKEN PAW, NOW IN SECLUSION PLAYERS LAUDED FOR AGGIES GAME GETS A DECISION NEAR FLORENCE

The effect of the victory of the Klamath Falls football team over the Ashland high school last Saturday, by a lone touchdown, has thrilled Klamath Falls, as nothing since the coming of the railroad, as attested by the following editorial in the Klamath Falls News of last Tuesday, under the heading, "Hurrah for the football boys":

Klamath's team went over to Ashland and cleaned up the neighboring high school's team in a mainly easy Saturday. Victory perched upon the student body banner.

The News is delighted—it is now cheering the home boys for they showed they have the stuff in them and the willingness to work in order to have a football team in Klamath Falls that the whole community can rally around.

The turning point has been reached and the turn has been made in favor of the home team purely upon its merits. Let the bonfires burn over the victory. Let the schools celebrate and let the city join them in a demonstration of appreciation for the way the boys played.

FEW COACHES USE SIMPLE FOOTBALL EASTERN GAMES

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—(AP)—The fireworks are due to start early in this season's football campaign in the east. On every hand coaches are abandoning the old idea of using only the simple formations in the early season games and are working hard to develop their best scoring plays. Only Tuss McLaughry at Brown has indicated his intention of using only straight football tactics in the opener against Worcester Poly Saturday.

The bigger colleges, inspired perhaps by the ever increasing danger of defeat at the hands of minor opponents, are preparing.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Light scrimmage by way of tapering off for their struggle with the strong Oregon State varsity was ordered today by Coach Howard Jones for his Trojan footballers. Francis Tappan was back at his right end position for practice today. The star wingman was kicked in the face during scrimmage on Tuesday and believed to have a fractured jaw, but an "X-ray" showed only a chipped cheek bone and bruises, which will not prevent his playing.

The old white ball was brought out yesterday as Coach Jones worked his men far into the night. Jones' new arrangement of linemen puts Captain Jesse Hibbs at left end on offense. With Jesse Shaw working the all-American's right tackle position, Charley Boren and Clark Galloway are installed at guards with Frank Anthony at left tackle. Tappan works at right end. On defense Hibbs returns to his tackle berth. Shaw moves over to guard and Boren goes on duty at end. This defensive formation is calculated to embarrass the Oregon tactics, as well as to give greater description.

Russ Saunders still holds forth at fullback, dynamic Don Williams at quarterback and Harry Edelson and Lloyd Thomas, the iron man, at the halfback positions.

The Spartans, composed of Trojan linemen and what-not, prompted by Jeff Cravath, took the part of the gentlemen from Corvallis during a run off of many Oregon plays last night.

Engine Mangles Man

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Sidney Stamp, 76, was mangled when struck by a switch engine at a street crossing today. He lost one leg and the other was amputated at a hospital. One hand was almost severed. His condition was critical and recovery doubtful.

PEORIA, Ill., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Les Marriner, sturdy Illinois heavyweight, has given one of the best demonstrations of gameness ever seen in the ring.

After being floored for a count of nine three times in three rounds in his bout with George Gennas of Philadelphia last night, Marriner discovered his right hand had been broken. Refusing to heed suggestions of his seconds that he quit, he fought on with such determination that he won the judges' decision, knocking his opponent down 11 times.

Marriner will be out of the ring for six weeks or more as the result of the injury, his trainer announced.

STANFORD-OREGON OPEN CONFERENCE SEASON SATURDAY

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Pop Warner, Stanford coach, and three complete teams, will arrive tomorrow for their football game with Oregon here Saturday. It will be the opening conference contest for both. Every regular except Preston, star end who will be out for three weeks with injuries, is making the trip.

Two Stanford regulars have not completely recovered from the bruises suffered in the tilt with the Olympic club last Saturday, which the clubmen won, 12 to 6, but they are expected to be in the game. They are Sims, half-back, and post, guard.

Oregon will not be free from cripples, with two of its regulars, still on the casualty list. Ted Pope, letterman end, and John Kitzmiller, sophomore fullback, are out with strained muscles, but both may get into Saturday's fray.

Because of the rain which has made the field slippery and difficult for the competition, Stanford is but a six-to-one favorite.

When fall practice started, September 15, Stanford was favored to beat Oregon by 21 points.

ROME, Oct. 4.—(AP) Having eluded the curious after their wedding, Mr. and Mrs. James Joseph Tunney today were presumed to be somewhere near Florence, scene of Dante's love for Beatrice. After the ceremonies in the seclusion of the Hotel Russie, Tunney brushed aside reporters and photographers as he and the former Polly Lauder made their way to an automobile in which they sped away in the twilight.

The bride wore a two-piece red broadcloth suit trimmed with black, flat fur and a wide red hat. She carried her bridal flowers. Tunney wore the blue sack suit in which he was married. It was thought that as well as visiting Florence they would tour other romantic and historical places including Perugia, where Pope Leo XIII was bishop for 30 years before being called to the Vatican, and Assisi, home of the humble St. Francis.

Their departure was delayed by a long drawn out luncheon which followed the religious and civil ceremonies, coffee and liquors being served late in the afternoon with the famous Roman sunshine pouring through the windows.

The Stars took another from the Missions 9 to 3 after Elmer Smith started a seventh inning rally with a homer. Hollywood chased in five runs that frame to take possession of the lead for the rest of the game. Batteries: Huley and Agnew; Nelson and Sypher.
