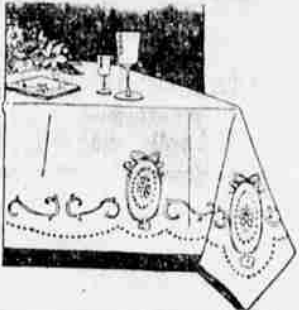

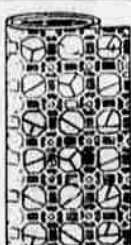

WATTERS COUPLE TAKEN TO SALEM; LEAVE CHILDREN

WOODS SECURES OAKLAND BOXER FOR O'GRADY GO

It was with a pair of dry eyes that Gertrude Watters, 25, found guilty jointly with her husband, of arson and acts of abnegation in their Thompson Creek farm last week, came down the stairs of the J. E. Daniels home this morning and called back what may be her last message to their four pretty little children huddled together, frightened, in a room above.

"Good-bye," she shouted. But there was no answer from any of the four.

"Good-bye—I'm going now," she called still louder, and when there was no response, she went outside, climbed into the car beside her husband and arrested him laughingly. Mrs. Watters is being taken to the state hospital for treatment, while Watters is leaving to serve his five year term, subject to change by the engineer board, at the state penitentiary. The couple, along with Lauri Wood, juvenile delinquent of Ashland, are being taken north by Mr. and Mrs. Louis Jennings, to be placed in their respective institutions.

Several minutes after the car had driven away from the Daniels home, the Watters children ventured down the stairway, one by one. First came Charles, 8, who when he reached the breakfast table, could no longer suppress his tears. The boy was comforted by Mrs. Daniels, kindly wife of the court house janitor, who has taken care of the children and of Mrs. Watters, since they were brought into the city. By the time the other younger children reached the lower floor, the boy had dried his tears and led the others over into the janitor's room in the court house to play.

Mrs. Ralph Jennings will take the four children back to Washington, Kansas tomorrow, where they will be placed in charge of Mrs. O. D. Clark, sister of Watters. That the mother will be well-cared for at the home of her foster parents in Everett, Washington, when she is allowed to leave the state hospital, was the assurance given by L. D. Dixon, foster father, who came from that city last night to visit Mrs. Watters and the children, and offer his services.

Mrs. Watters was taken from a children's home in Portland when she was six years old, by the Dixons. In spite of their pleading, she married Dan Watters, then a stage driver and twice her age, when she was 18 years old. Watters is now 46 years old.

O'Grady has always looked like a "comer" in past engagements, but seldom has he had to extend himself in a fight here Friday's battle, however, promises to be a different story as the Oakland boy has a record of 10 ring victories unmarred by defeats. Among these successful fights he boasts of four knockouts. In looking over Hottinger's record it is to be remembered that in Oakland a fighter meets some pretty stiff competition.

And the O'Grady-Hottinger 10-round mix will not be the only big scrap on Sallor Jack's next card. Pat Padelford, who looked mighty good in his recent fight here with Lakey Morrison, Filipino lightweight, will tangle with Willie Wilson, clever El Paso mitt artist. Wilson, according to advance dope, is more than willing in the ring and should give the local boy an interesting six rounds.

Roschitz is to be represented on next Friday's card by Italian Joe Corbett, who will be pitted against Kid Wagner of this city in a four-round special event. Bud Riley and Chet Graham, two Medford aspirants for pugilistic honors, will meet in another four-round engagement. As a certain rascal there will be a three-round mix which will complete what looks to be an exceptionally good 27-round card. Sallor Jack Wood and his various battlers will hold a workout at the new hall in the Children's building tonight at 7:30 and fans have been invited to attend. Permanent, comfortable seats have replaced temporary seats used for the last smoker and the new hall is now ready to accommodate a record turnout for next Friday's fight program.

Some of the most destructive outbreaks of bacterial wilt in the last few years have occurred in fields where the plants have suffered severe winter injury.
