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EPISCOPALIANS FACE IMPORTANT MATTERS WASHINGTON MEET

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Charged with solution of problems important to every diocese in the nation, 25,000 religious pilgrims, members of the Protestant Episcopal church will move into Washington October 19 to 23, to attend the forty-ninth general convention of that communion.

It was one of the most significant meetings in 143 years of Episcopal history, or since the first general convention of the church in America. The convention is expected to result in adoption of a revised Book of Common Prayer. The Book of Common Prayer was compiled by Archbishop Cranmer and 12 associates during the 12-year period, 1549 to 1552. Only three revisions have been made in the history of the American church.

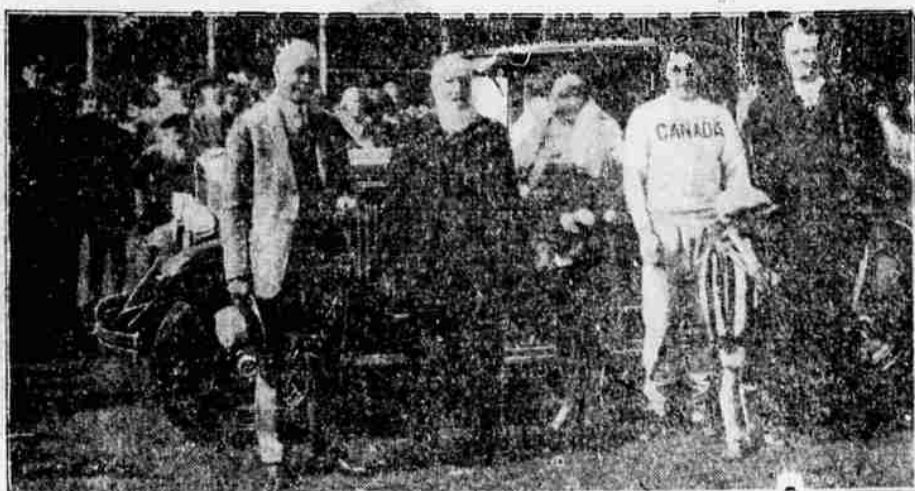
Secretary Kellogg, of the state department, will preside at a service in the interest of International Peace October 21. Senator Borah and Bishop Brent will be the speakers. The latter was chief chaplain of the A. E. F., and presided at the world conference on Faith and Order at Lausanne, Switzerland, last summer.

The first service of the series will be conducted October 7, when the Brotherhood of St. Andrew discusses personal evangelism and the opportunity for lay activity in religious advancement.

A number of the convention executive meetings will be conducted in Memorial Continental Hall, erected by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

"Ann Manages", Radio Play By Helen Norris To Be Presented Over KMED At An Early Date

Helen Norris is a powerful name. First there was Helen of Troy, then there was Helen Keller, and here's another Helen who is winning through in the face of a tremendous handicap—"Helen Norris, the author." She has already written five really worthwhile, full length plays, created exclusively for the radio.

Since the presentation of her first play, "Just Plannin'", over KGO last February, the life of the little girl who lives near Medford, Oregon, has been enriched immensely through contact with hundreds of just "plain folk."

This play was a dramatic revelation of how she sat in her home, happily able to move, with her radio books and don, "Just Plannin'."

"That evening as I sat in my home listening to the KGO Players I felt utterly in visualizing my audience," Miss Norris told Milton Samuel of KGO, when he visited her in Medford, Oregon, recently.

"I did think of a few friends here and a few friends there, possibly in Portland, Los Angeles and other coast points, who might be listening, but I had no idea of the many thousands of people who were sincerely interested in the play until the flood of letters poured in."

"And how I do enjoy the letters that come to me after the presentation of my plays, especially those from those tucked away in corners where any form of drama is a rare treat. Letters from people in every walk of life. I have had a great many letters from those who cannot see. To bring an hour's happiness to them makes amuse and entertain them, to me very happy. Think of sharing a sympathetic chord—all

that to me is gloriously worthwhile."
"Baker's Dog," her latest effort, is to be given over KGO, of Oakland, on Thursday night, November 1, at 7:30 o'clock.

"Ann Manages," presented over KGO last Thursday evening will be repeated over KMED, as have Miss Norris' other plays, next Tuesday evening.

MOTORISTS URGED US ESPECIAL CAUTION IN SCHOOL ZONES

Motorists owe an obligation to school children to drive in such a way as to overcome the hazards of the youngsters crossing the streets—officials of local motor clubs.

With the reopening of public and private schools in October, motorists should realize that safety zones in front of school buildings are for their own protection as well as that of children and be extremely cautious in respecting them.

Among the hundreds of children returning to the school rooms during the winter will be many little ones of four, five and six years of age who for the first time are leaving the protection and safety of their homes to attend school. "They deserve the protection of every thoughtful motorist," he continued.

"While mothers are preparing clothing, securing books and making other arrangements for the younger members of the family to attend school, the fathers should give attention to their cars in order to see that the horn is fully functioning properly to sound necessary warnings, that the brakes are operating smoothly in order that quick stops can be made and that the car generally is working efficiently," Mr. Brandenburg continued.

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ALLEGED PRISONER FIRED ON WIDOW FOR SMALL SUM

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Police said today they had a confession from one of two prisoners in the county jail here that he had fired on a 42-year-old widow with a shotgun for an expected consideration of \$50 in order that his brother-in-law might marry her daughter unhindered.

Ray Bozeman, 23, was the prisoner, and with the brother-in-law, William D. Nixon, was held without charge pending investigation. Mr. Nixon said he had been friendly with Myrtle, 19-year-old daughter of Mrs. Amanda King of Crawshaw court, but denied any connection with the wounding of the woman, who is in a Troy, Ala., hospital in a critical condition. He said Bozeman had been drinking.

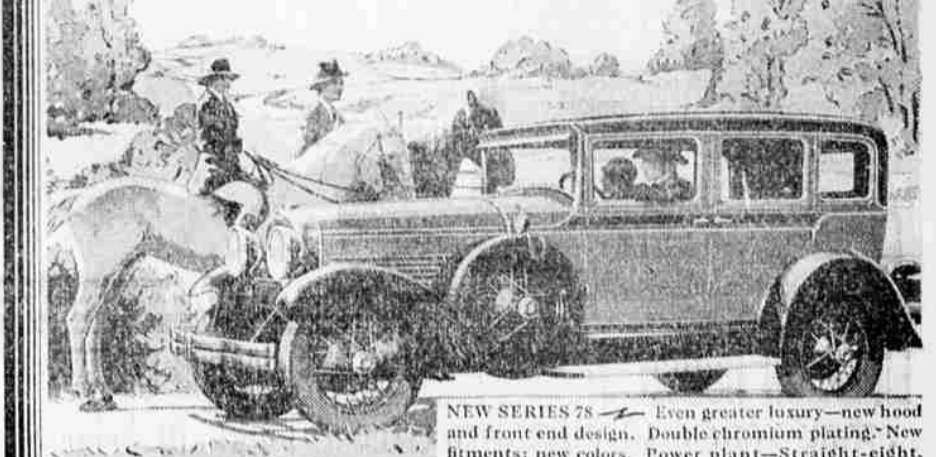
