JACKSON, Miss., Oct. 3. (AP)—Desired for use of bulletproof car by Mayor Walter A. Smith, former Congressman William D. Phillips of Georgia delivered one of a series of addresses in opposition to Governor Alfred E. Smith in Jefferson City on Tuesday night, Oct. 2, 1935, and received an ovation. Phillips was not asked for the microphone, but others near him were, including Mrs. T. S. Ward, whose husband has offered him reward for information leading to the capture of George Horatio Wallis, member of the House, former Democratic executive committee chairman, the only party to meet him face to face.

Frequently, during the address in Jefferson City, Phillips was called a "Hatch for Al Smith."

**VIOLENCE HINTED
IN GIRL'S DEATH**

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NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—(AP)—The body of Elizabeth Chatterton Pooley, 21 years old, former actress, was being held at the morgue today while authorities investigated a report that her death had resulted from violence.

Miss Pooley, who shared a room at the Hotel Concord with Lillian Lorraine, former Ziegfeld Follies star, died last night at a private hospital where she was admitted early Monday. Police were working on a report that she had been beaten in a night club row about 12 o'clock.

Police are also investigating myocarditis, inflammation of the heart tissues, as the cause of death.

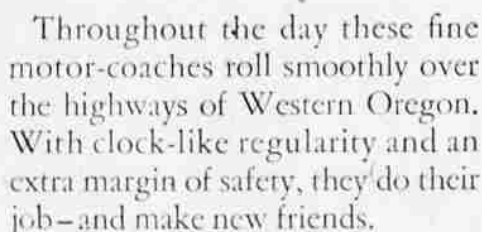
The delegates are entertained last night in address by Secretary of the State, C. C. Hoan, and Mayor A. L. Davis.

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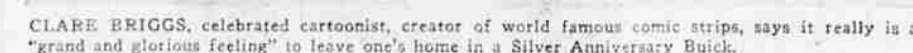
