## MEDFORD PEOPLE IN SMASHUP ON SEXTON MOUNTAIN

Four Medford residents sustained minor cuts and bruises last evening at 5 o'clock when a car driven by C. C. Hoover was struck near the summit of Sexton mountain by one driven by Jesus Padillo of Odell, Ore. John Solis, an occupant of the Hoover machine, today reported a badly cut ear as the result of being thrown through the windshield.

Two women occupants of the Padillo machine sustained cuts, but were not seriously injured. A short time earlier yesterday afternoon, an alleged run-running Buick crashed while coming down the Siskiyou mountains. Padillo and Jose Lamson of the Odell machine are in the Josephine county jail charged with the possession and transportation of 3 gallons of alleged moonshine, which was found in their car shortly after the crash.

Hoover, accompanied by Mrs. Hoover and Mr. and Mrs. John Solis, were returning from Roseburg and were nearing the summit of the mountain when Padillo on route north, began his descent. Although there was ample room to drive by, it is alleged the Mexican swerved and struck Hoover broadside, tearing off one wheel and throwing the local car down an embankment of several hundred feet. If the wheel had not been torn off, said Mrs. Hoover this forenoon, the car would have rolled down the mountain, probably ending with fatal results for members of the party.

### Bank Statement Reflects Growth of Eagle Point

Reflection of a steady gain in business conditions in and around Eagle Point is shown by the statement of the Eagle Point State bank as called for by the bank commissioner.

There has been a substantial gain in deposits and the total on September 30th was \$27,842.23, with cash reserve and securities of nearly \$56,000. The total resources were \$117,201.86.

### Central Point Bank Shows Big Gains in Three Months

The report of the Central Point State bank, published yesterday, shows that institution is keeping step with the progress of southern Oregon, and particularly with the city and surrounding territory.

The total resources of the bank at the close of business September 30 were \$31,253.24. The deposits were \$31,119.97, a gain of over \$50,000 in three months. The cash on hand was \$114,500, with bonds to the amount of \$131,000, making \$245,500 in quick assets.

## CHILOQUIN MEN SENTENCED TODAY MULTNOMAH JAIL

(Cal) Callender and Gus Hirschberger, both of Chiloquin, found guilty of sale and possession of liquor, by a jury in the federal court were this morning each sentenced to serve six months in the county jail of Multnomah county. They were trial operators of Chiloquin and during the trial Hirschberger assumed all the blame for the violations.

Jack Martin of Fort Klamath, found guilty of liquor violations, was scheduled to appear for sentence this morning, was unable to appear, owing to accidentally shooting himself in the right foot, and his sentencing was deferred until the next term of court.

Karl Smith of Klamath Falls entered a plea of guilty before Judge Bean this morning, and was sentenced to nine months in the Multnomah county jail on information charging sale and possession of liquor, and the maintenance of a nuisance at 1815 Earl street, Klamath Falls.

## REGISTRATION IS RECORD BREAKER JACKSON COUNTY

The registration for the general election November 6, in this county will total well over 18,000—the highest in the history of the county—according to estimates made this morning by County Clerk Delilah Stevens Meyers. The county clerk estimates that over 5000 voters registered since the primaries this year, when 13,011 votes were cast. Over 2000 registration cards have been sent to the secretary of state at Salem for listing, and according to the local official figures, there are 2000 more to come from this county.

Definite figures upon the registration will not be available for ten days owing to the heavy clerical work involved.

The registration increase indicates a growth in the population of Jackson county, and the county clerk estimates that 1500 of the registrants are newcomers from other states.

Out of 321 registration cards sent in from Ashland precincts, sixty of the lot were from people who had cancelled their registrations in other states. There are also many cancellations by voters who have come here from other sections of Oregon. There are also many new resident voters in the Jacksonville precincts.

There are also many voters just coming of age, and many who for years have not registered but have voted by the "swearing in" process which was abolished by the last legislature.

## FORESTRY OFFICE COMPILES REPORT SEASON'S FIRES

A total of 111 forest fires including three grades, A, B, and C, the A's being smallest areas, is the official report just compiled at the local forestry office for the summer period.

Last year there were 109 fires in the territory under the local bureau's supervision. The largest area to be burned over this season was 700 acres in the Applegate district, known as the Bishop creek fire.

Seventy-four fires were caused by such-sunny fire builders who failed to obey the law; brush fires; railroad blazes; hunters and insecticides. The remaining 37 fires were set by lightning.

Considering the fact that there were approximately 80,000 tourists who traveled to Crater lake over the highway from the Medford entrance during the summer months, the number of fires—111—caused by smokers along the route, was remarkably small. N. C. White, assistant supervisor of the Crater Lake National forest, said this morning. He also stated that travelers are evidently taking more precautions than they formerly did.

## FORD SEEKS CAR ANCIENT VINTAGE IN PATENT SUIT

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 11.—(AP) Search lights been instituted by Henry Ford, General Motors and other automobile manufacturing interests for a specific type of automobile manufactured before 1909, discovery of which is expected to save millions for the defendants in a patent infringement suit brought by the Packard Motor Car company.

Grays and barns of the weathered set at Newport have been subjected to an intense search by Ford agents. They are looking for an electric vehicle made by the Pope Manufacturing company in 1898, at that time called "Dus A Don." It had seats for four passengers, two of whom sat with their backs to the others.

The automobile is believed to have been equipped with demountable and interchangeable wheels, a vital factor in the search, for it is with reference to this phase of construction that the patent suit is concerned.

## WARDEN'S SLAYER TAKES CIGARETTE TO THE SCAFFOLD

JOLIET, Ill., Oct. 11.—(AP)—Chas. Shader was executed at the Will county jail yesterday, the fourth to hang for the slaying of Deputy Warden Peter Klein during a Joliet pentonitary escape in May, 1925. Shader approached the scaffold calmly, smoking a cigarette. He had awaited the hour of his hanging stoically, and refused sympathy.

The Rev. Peter Kiley of St. Mary's church, Joliet, and two other clergymen led Shader to the scaffold. As the blindfolds were applied Shader shouted to Jailer Jas. McKeown: "So long, Charlie."

James Price and Bernard Roa, who participated in the escape in which Warden Klein was shot, are still fugitives.
