

FINAL ARGUMENTS  
RUM RING CASES  
FEDERAL COURT

A jury in the federal court this afternoon returned a verdict of guilty against the so-called Chilquin rum ring, on 24 of the 22 counts of the indictment against them, charging sale and possession of liquor, conspiracy and maintenance of nuisance.

The court announced that sentence would be passed upon the seven defendants this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. They are ten Mitchell, reputed bootleg king of the reservation town, Jim Sinclair, his chief aide, J. C. Blatt, driver of the rum car, Carlos Blair, former Indian policeman the government charged with furnishing protection to the ring and adding in the return of his jacket liquor, W. E. (Blarky) Bailey and Richard (Lefty) Lory, supervisors of beer joints, and Leonard Parazzo, half-brother of Mitchell and asserted liquor salesman.

Final arguments were completed at 5 o'clock yesterday in the Chilquin rum ring trial, which has been underway in the federal court all this week.

The closing argument for the government was made by United States District Attorney George Neuner, who bitterly assailed the seven defendants, and described their base of operations—Chiloquin, a reservation town—as "a cancerous growth on the state of Oregon."

The defense's plea, that the men on trial were the victims of a "frame-up" was also roundly berated.

"Whenever the government cannot procure evidence against prohibition violators, it is time to turn things over to the bootleggers of Chiloquin."

"Defense counsel was right when he said that much more could be told about conditions in Chiloquin than has ever been told in this trial," shouted the fiery prosecutor.

"But it will be told some day, when the government gets the evidence it wants."

He further declared, "There may be developments that will be brought to the attention of a jury."

The activities of Ralph Kelly, a special dry agent at Dorris, Cal., were branded as "something you wouldn't do, and something I wouldn't do, but it is the only way Uncle Sam has of securing liquor evidence."

Prosecutor Neuner described the defendants as "hoor boobies" for falling for the undercover agents ruse they were liquor dealers from Sacramento.

Jeff Brophy, a former Medford resident, and Justice of the peace at Chiloquin, was called "the chief custodian of the home for the bootleggers of Chiloquin."

RAPID PROGRESS

POWER COMPANY  
EQUITY LAWSUIT  
IN COURT TODAY

The equity suit of the California Oregon Power company against the City of Gold Hill and the Beaver-Portland Cement company began this morning in the federal court before Judge Robert S. Bean.

The suit is the outgrowth of legal actions which have been under way between the two litigants for a number of months, and involves the water and power rights on Rogue river at Gold Hill.

The California Oregon Power company contends that it desires to build a \$750,000 power plant upon the site in controversy to serve the district between Gold Hill and Grants Pass and later to Kerby, Ore. and to serve as a standby station for the Medford and Ashland districts in case of transmission trouble.

The power company also desires to build a municipal power plant upon the same site, owning the opposite side of the river from the power company's holdings for a distance of one mile.

The power company holds that a public utility is able to furnish Gold Hill with abundant power and will build to meet any future needs. The city also owns certain water rights to Rogue river granted by the state engineering department.

At a city election held last year Gold Hill citizens voted for the building of a municipal plant. In condemnation proceedings in the circuit court a jury decided in favor of the power company. The power company last summer appealed to the federal court for a final decision.

There is considerable interest in the case in the Gold Hill district. The testimony in the case is technical and expert and is expected to be concluded by tomorrow noon.

Attorney Gus Newberry appears for the City of Gold Hill and the Beaver-Portland Cement company, and Attorney Egan Reames for the power company.

The criminal docket of the federal court for the southern Oregon term was concluded this morning with the submission of the Chilquin rum case to the jury.

The present case is the last one on the federal court docket.

United States District Attorney George Neuner of Portland, left today for Douglas county, his home territory, where he will renew old acquaintances and make three political speeches on national and local issues. He is about to speak tonight at Looking Glass, tomorrow afternoon before the W. C. T. U. convention and tomorrow night will address the voters of Sutherlin.

WESTERN STATES  
FEDERAL WARDEN  
TO FISH ROGUE

Attracted by the reports of good fishing in the Rogue river, Major Lawrence Mott of Catalina Island, federal game warden for the western United States bank as far as Billings, Mont., accompanied by 2112 Mott, is spending several weeks in southern Oregon and today left for the lower Rogue river to spend several days, after which he will return to Medford to be a guest of William Loney at his Big Rock Lodge on the river between Table Rock and Trail.

Major Mott, who is also a member of the United States army corps and former city editor of the New York Herald, has been on a tour of inspection of game and fish conditions in the Pacific coast for the federal game and fish departments. Before arriving in Medford, he spent three days in Klamath county and a short time in Trinity county, Calif.

In Trinity county, he found some conditions to be serious due to work of coyotes, which have been killing fawns as rapidly as they are born. He fears that if the situation is not remedied, deer will be a thing of the past in the Trinity section of California. He was pleased to learn that a similar situation does not exist in southern Oregon.

Major Mott had heard of the Rogue river for several years and had planned an outing here since he had not up until this year, but had not had ample time for the trip. He expressed himself to be delighted with the appearance of the water and indicated he would be in southern Oregon until the first part of next month.

Major Mott reserved considerable voluntary assistance in regard to local fishing conditions from Mr. Loney this morning.

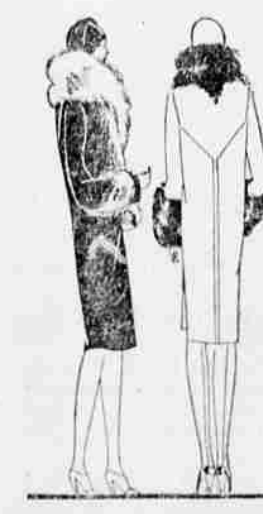
