

FEHL EXPLAINS HIS POSITION ON ROAD ISSUE

Believing that the people of the City of Medford are entitled to know just what has transpired relative to the paving situation, on South Park Avenue, I beg leave to submit the following state of facts: The Medford City Charter requires that before property can be assessed for paving, a petition signed by abutting property owners owning a majority of the lineal feet upon the proposed improvement as shown by the records in the office of the County Recorder must be filed and presented to the City Council. A petition containing only approximately 25% of such owners was filed on South Park Avenue. At that time no one evidenced any disposition to contest the proceedings because it was understood by the people living on the street, by reason of assurance given by the city officials, that the street was to be paved with concrete, which was what the abutting property owners desired. This was the situation until the night the bids were let, at which time the Mayor and City Council refused to consider anything but black top paving. Naturally, all of us who desired concrete paving protested, interceded and requested that we be given concrete paving and were informed by the Mayor and some members of the City Council that it did not make any difference what we wanted, we either had to take black top paving or none. In view of the fact that the abutting property owner must pay for the paving in front of his property none of us could see the justice upon the part of the city officials, and I did not then nor do I now expect to be bound by such an American attitude thus displayed. Thereupon I advised them that if they would have concrete laid on this street I would not do anything to interfere, which I did not intend to do. I made pay for black top paving, which I did not want, and which I did not think, would be satisfactory paving for this street, inasmuch as some grading had already been done, the city officials thereupon advised me that they would not do anything for the people on this street and would let the street remain a veritable mudhole unless I acquiesced in their plan to put black top paving on this street. I do not want a mudhole in front of my property, but I do not expect or intend to sacrifice my rights as an American citizen and property owner on this street in order to gratify and satisfy any whims of the Mayor and City Council, particularly since I will have to pay my part of the bill for any paving.

The matter is now pending in the courts. Judge Walker has said the complaint which I filed is sufficient. I am informed by my attorney and I believe that the injunction will be made permanent, since I can establish these facts, but upon behalf of the people living on this street, I am willing to go any length to have the street made passable, unless it is necessary that I should agree to black top paving thereon. The city can finish the grading of this street by an expenditure of a small sum of money or they can put down concrete pavement, which will give us a good pavement and satisfy everyone.

The City and Mr. Herrold, the paving contractor, have given the impression, through the medium of the press, that a trial on this matter cannot be had immediately. At all times I have been ready and desirous of a speedy trial. There is no reason for delay. If the City or Mr. Herrold had any defense they should have known it and could have prepared the same weeks ago, and consequently the only reason that I can see for their delay is that they desire to create public opinion against me.

MAY HOLD HEALTH MEETING YEARLY IN BUTTE FALLS

Health workers from all over the county convened Monday in Butte Falls at one of the most successful meetings ever held by the Jackson County Public Health Association. In fact, it was such a success and, at this time of the year, such a beautiful place to drive to with the forests brilliant in autumn colors, that Miss Carlton, the president, recommended that it become an annual event. Butte Falls being the newest of the community health groups, it seemed natural to have the first of the season's bi-monthly meetings there and it was a plan fully appreciated by the town for the church where the meeting was held, was crowded.

The picnic lunch served as a good opportunity for every one to get acquainted. The ladies of the local health group had arranged tables in the domestic science room of the high school and had an abundance of vegetable stew and coffee to supplement the lunches. The lecture by Dr. Warner on the nutrition of the growing child was greatly appreciated and was followed by questions from mothers, grandmothers, teachers, and nurses. The definite and detailed advice given by Dr. Warner on the feeding of the infant and child could leave no one in doubt as to the value of the latest findings in science, combined with her wealth of experience. After explaining how orange, tomato, or cabbage juice should be used for infants to prevent and correct rickets, and how the lack of iron after the 6 months' period may be anticipated by the use of whole grain cereals, spinach, egg yolks and cottage cheese, Dr. Warner said the infant had habits started that would never interfere with nutrition. She has recently examined 300 freshmen girls at Corvallis, and said it was easy to detect those who had not been properly fed against rickets, as infants, because of their enlarged joints, uneven bone formation, as well as more serious indications.

SEARCH BEGUN FOR SUBMARINE

PARIS, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Search for the French submarine Ondine, two days overdue at Bizerta, the fortified seaport of Tunis, the submarine was on an endurance run from Cherbourg and was due at Bizerta Tuesday. The ministry of marine, while expressing the belief that absence of news was explainable by a breakdown of the wireless, ordered naval vessels and airplanes to search.

The normal crew of the Ondine is 40 officers and men. It has a displacement of 600 tons on the surface and 745 tons when submerged.

Miss Goodrich obtained a supreme court order permitting service of papers in the action by publication and by mailing a copy to Van Loon at Waalhaven, Veere, Holland. She asks temporary alimony and counsel fees. Van Loon and Miss Goodrich were married last October at Elizabeth, N. J., and maintained separate establishments here for some time thereafter. They explained this was due to professional reasons only and not a form of companionate marriage.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 11.—(AP)—Oregon Knights of Pythias, at their closing grand lodge session here yesterday, presented 25-year grand lodge veterans' jewels to Frank S. 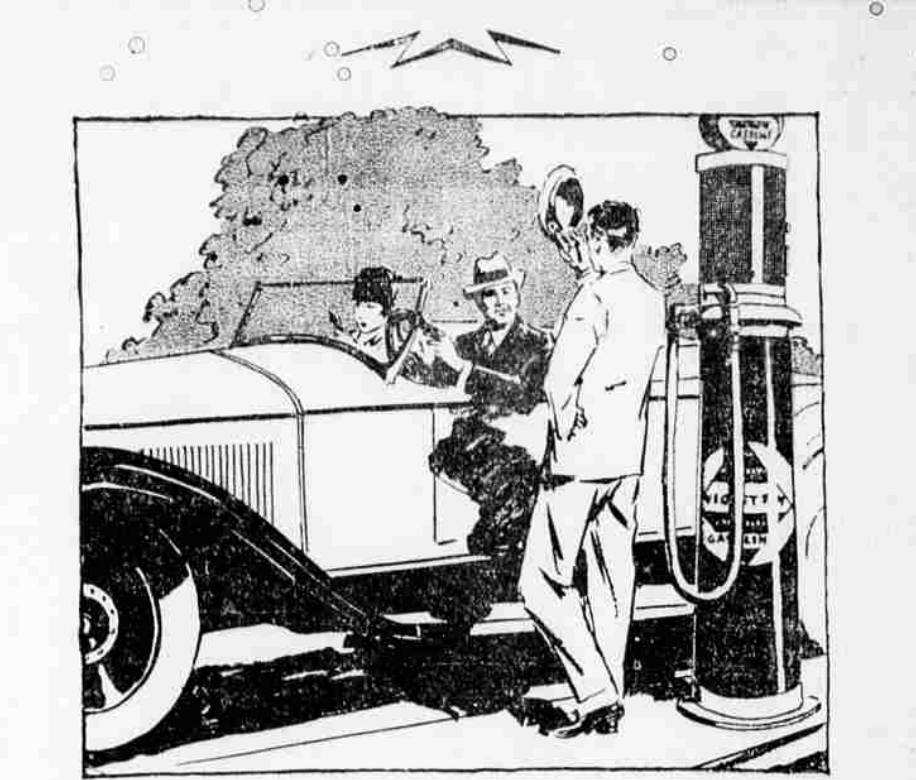
FREE TICKETS TO MOVIE FANS
