SOLON AND SEAL DEADLOCK HOLDS IN COAST SERIES

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Having each stowed away a game in the bag, the Sacramento Senators and the San Francisco Seals met today in the third game of the seven-game series for the Pacific Coast league championship.

The Senators opened in the count yesterday, 8-7, in an exciting game that saw Manager Nick Williams of the Seals charged off the field for disputing decisions shortly before umpire Henry Fanning was temporarily disabled by a thrown ball from Elmer Jacobs, right hander, who opened for the San Francisco club.

Jacobs was yanked in the fourth when the Senators made their eighth run. He eventually decided the game and also was fired by Harry A. Williams, league president, for unsportsmanlike conduct. Just after he was relieved, Jacobs threw the ball wildly to his father and it struck Fanning on the knee. The arbiter was unable to finish the game.

The Seals went into the lead with one run in the first frame but fell behind in the fourth when Sacramento brought over half a dozen tallies.

San Francisco counted four times in the seventh off five hits, but it was not enough to overcome the Sacramento lead.

Two right-handers are slated to meet today. Al Gould, security moundman who helped check the Seals last Sunday in the deciding game that brought the Senators victory in the last half of the split season, has been assigned heavy duty today. Hollis Thurston, versatile Seals, has been selected by Manager Williams of San Francisco.

About 7000 persons attended yesterday and the third game of the series is expected to bring out even more.

BEAR AND COUGAR ENDING PRACTICE FOR SATURDAY GO

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 12.—(AP)—The University of California football team prepared to start the memorial stadium with the Washington State Cougar, here today, as the two teams started their day of practice before their conference encounter tomorrow.

The northern team were to have a light workout today after their arrival, with the Bears following them with practice late in the afternoon.

The California practice session yesterday disclosed that Coach "Doc" Eide will depend largely on an aerial game to gain ground against the Cougars.

The Washington State team, however, here believe, will depend largely on a power attack concentrated against the center of the line. The Cougars have one of the strongest center lines in the conference, while the Bears have not shown much there this season.

CROWD EXPECTED NOTRE DAME-NAVY GAME TOMORROW

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Two hundred eleven, Notre Dame and the Navy, already jolted and seared by the last of defeat, will join in combat on Soldier Field tomorrow before probably the largest multitude ever to witness a football game in America.

One hundred and twenty thousand persons, judging by thousands the previous record-breaking throng that jammed into the huge stadium on the shore of Lake Michigan for the Notre Dame-University of Southern California spectacle a year ago, are expected to watch the clash. So great has been the demand for tickets that extra bleachers have been erected and every inch of available space utilized to accommodate, if necessary, 120,000.
