

HUESTON, EGAN BEAT KIRKWOOD AND SYD SMITH

Medford Pro Proves Class in Foursome Clash—Famed Trick Golf Artist Amazes Local Fans With Startling Shots.

Joe Kirkwood, famed trick golfer, amused, thrilled and instructed a crowd of about 100 golf fans at the Medford Golf club yesterday after he paired with Sydney Smith—had been defeated in an 18-hole foursome by H. Chandler Egan and Jack Hueston, the local pro, four up.

Exhibitions for many years in all parts of the country, he seemed to enjoy the stunts yesterday as much as his enthusiastic spectators.

There isn't space to recount all of his exploits, but the following will give some idea of his extraordinary performance:

With two clubs, grasped together, he hit two balls simultaneously, gave one a dose of the other a sharp back, and named his shot to a girl's eyelash.

With three balls held perfectly steadily by mouth's edge, one above the other, he drove out the middle ball, without touching the other two.

Imbuing one of the club's most enthusiastic golfers, Charles Morgan, who was an interested spectator, Kirkwood made what looked like a perfect and terrific swing and merely fanned the ball three feet ahead of the tee. He followed this with what he called the "morning star" stroke, and with another mighty heave, sliced the ball about 29 feet, directly at right angles to the desired line.

He made a perfect shot off of one of "Ted Miles' programs as a tee, and then—continuing his playful banter throughout—sawd Miles' watch for a tee, smashed out a second and never scratched the crystal.

He made perfect brassies and approaches with eight balls in a row, he swung so rapidly and in such perfect rhythm that all were in the air at one time, and then to show that keeping the eye on the ball is all "appearance," he knocked four balls straight up the course while he turned his head in another direction.

He shot a few backspinners to the green that landed in one direction and then ran back in the other. With his back to the green and the ball in the back of a trap he sent the ball over a hole somewhat over his head, landing on the green.

Finally he summed up the art of successful golf as follows:

1—Take an easy, comfortable stance, with plenty of room for the arms to swing.

7—Become relaxed in every muscle.
8—Keep the head still.
No good golfer, said the Australian pro, ever thinks about this much advertised snap of the wrist. Merely swing naturally, and the snap of the wrist takes care of itself.

There promises to be a lot of relaxed golfers at the local club for the next few days at least.

The foursome proved a walk-away for Hueston and Egan. Hueston played a beautiful game, being low man on the first nine, and tied with Kirkwood for low score on the second. For the 18, Hueston shot a 72—only two over par. Kirkwood at 75, Egan a 77 and Smith at 82.

Kirkwood showed some of his trick shots in the foursome and played what was for him only an average game. The best shot of the 18 holes was made by Chandler Egan, who got off to a bad start with even fives on the first four holes. On the long third, Egan pulled a short drive into the rough within two feet of the big tree, but made a perfect recovery, hitting the ball against the tree trunk. The ball took a bad bounce, however, and he was stranded against the big oak, this side of the green. Here Egan cut out a perfect slice, which curved around the tree and landed nicely on the green, while the big gallery applauded.

It was too cold and windy for the foursome and only three holes were played on the 18th when Jack Hueston got a two, and one on the next hole when Egan dropped a beautiful three. Kirkwood scratched the only hole on the 11th with a three. It was Syd Smith's first appearance in such a foursome, and under the circumstances he did remarkably well, being low man on two holes.

Kirkwood left last night for San Francisco and will sail for his home in Australia next week. He made many friends by his genial, sportsmanlike manner, and no noted golfer who ever visited here saw the game such a vigorous host.
