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BEAR TAKES CARE OF CARETAKER'S FOOD AT CRATER LODGE

Standing in the middle of the commissary room at the Crater Lake Lodge, caretaker Stone looked mournfully to the right and left where hunks of smoked ham and bone scattered here and there made him wish that there was no law against killing bears in the park.

Mr. Stone had stacked up his food for a long winter's stay at the lodge and, being especially fond of ham, he had selected a large supply with much care. The caretaker has no family and this will be his first winter at the resort.

Thursday night a hungry bear came nosing around and was attracted to the window of the commissary below the kitchen. He sniffed ham and other things and immediately proceeded to investigate, his first step being to dig through the shutters on the window.

Just how long the intruder stayed and whether or not he carried anything off for his bear friends, Mr. Stone does not know. He is sure of one thing, according to Colonel C. G. Thomson, who visited at the lodge soon after the disaster took place—more care will be taken of the caretaker's food from now on.
