LONDON, Oct. 12.—The British foreign office announced today that Sir Esme Howard, British ambassador to the United States since 1924, would be retired in December, 1929. He will then reach the age limit of 65 and, according to civil service regulations, must relinquish his post.

Sir Esme's five-year term will expire in February, 1929, but it will be renewed so that he may complete his diplomatic career in the United States.

TENGWALD LEAVES FOR ELKS MEET

Carl Y. Tengwald, exalted ruler of the Medford lodge of Elks, will leave tomorrow evening for Portland to take part in a conference of the 12 exalted rulers in Oregon with Murray Halbert, grand exalted ruler for the United States, next Monday afternoon. Grand Exalted Ruler Halbert is making a tour of the nation getting in closer touch with the individual lodges and according to present plans, Portland will be the only city in Oregon he will visit.

Efforts will be made, however, by the Medford and Ashland lodges to induce him to visit southern Oregon and possibly stop in Medford. If nothing more can be done, it is planned to give the highest official of Elksdom an opportunity of seeing the Rogue River valley from a motor car by taking him off the train here and taking him over the Ashtabut mountains, after which he will be placed back on the train.

Exalted Ruler Tengwald will also attend a meeting of the state association of Elks lodges while in Portland.

AMERICAN MINER REPORTED SLAIN

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 12.—(AP)—A Guadalupe dispatch to El Universal today said that an American miner named Charles Smith had been slain by insurgents at Ara Juez. His address in the United States was not given.

The dispatch said that Smith refused to deliver money demanded by the insurgents, who were commanded by Jorge Ibarra, and gave no further details. Civil and military authorities were stated to be actively pursuing the insurgents.

AGAINST LAW TO KILL WOOD DUCKS

Of interest to duck hunters is the fact that during the last week, numerous wood ducks have been seen in the Bear creek region and on the desert land near Eagle Point.

It is against the law to kill this particular type of bird due to the fact that for some years they have been practically extinct and an effort has been made to let them get a head start on hunters.

Wood ducks are medium sized birds and are considered the most desirable of all, being especially good game because their nests are easy to find.

"Most of the accidents with firearms where children are concerned come from prohibiting them to handle guns or the other extreme—giving them guns and no instructions for using them." E. W. Dick, local meteorologist, who has been a member of the National Rifle association for the past nine years, said today in discussing the importance of proper training of the public in use of firearms.

A plan for reorganizing the branch of the National Rifle association is now under way, and according to Mr. Dick, every city should have such an organization. "Training for good marksmanship tends to produce steady nerves which are essential for a hunter. A majority of the accidents we read about are caused by inexperience in handling guns resulting in uncertain aims and general recklessness," the expert said.
