ROAD PROGRAM TO SCHOOL FIGURES AWAIT RESULT OF DUNNE BILL FATE SHOW 6 PER CENT GAIN OVER 1927

The 1928 road program of Jackson county is being held in abeyance pending the completion of the work of the budget committee, and the result of the vote on the Dunne motor bills at the November election. If the Dunne bills, which provide for an increase in the gas tax, and a reduction in the license fee for autos carry, the road program would be slated to proceed. County Judge Sparrow said this morning.

The budget committee met yesterday and "pruned" from all departments including the road expenses, in order to keep within the six per cent limitation. Until the budget committee has completed its sessions, funds available for roadwork next year will not be known.

Several of the road districts in the county are voting special levies for road work. County graders are now busy on the rural roads getting them in shape for winter, including the Gatte Falls and Evans Creek roads. In the latter section, a popular subscription has been taken up to complete the road work.

Judge Sparrow, who has had much experience in federal and military road construction said this morning that "he would rather build a half mile of good road, than ten miles of snake trail, that was a constant source of expense." He said he intended to make a trip over the rural roads of the county before it gets too wet.

MUSIC ACTIVITIES IN HIGH SCHOOL GAIN INTEREST

With 66 students enrolled in the music department of the local high school, considerable interest prevails in the future musical activities during the year.

The boys' and girls' glee club, which are competitive each year through enthusiastic try-outs, are rehearsing for a number of public performances, both in school assemblies and outside. The boys' club is composed of 28 members and the girls' of 40. Aside from these, there are a boys' quartet and a girls' quartet, as well as a girls' double quartet.

The object of the music department activity is to give specific and intensive training to those students who are gifted along musical lines, and who wish to take up the work seriously. Miss Esther Church, supervisor, contributed considerably to musical entertainments throughout the county last year, and her programs during this term are anticipated with pleasure by local music lovers.
