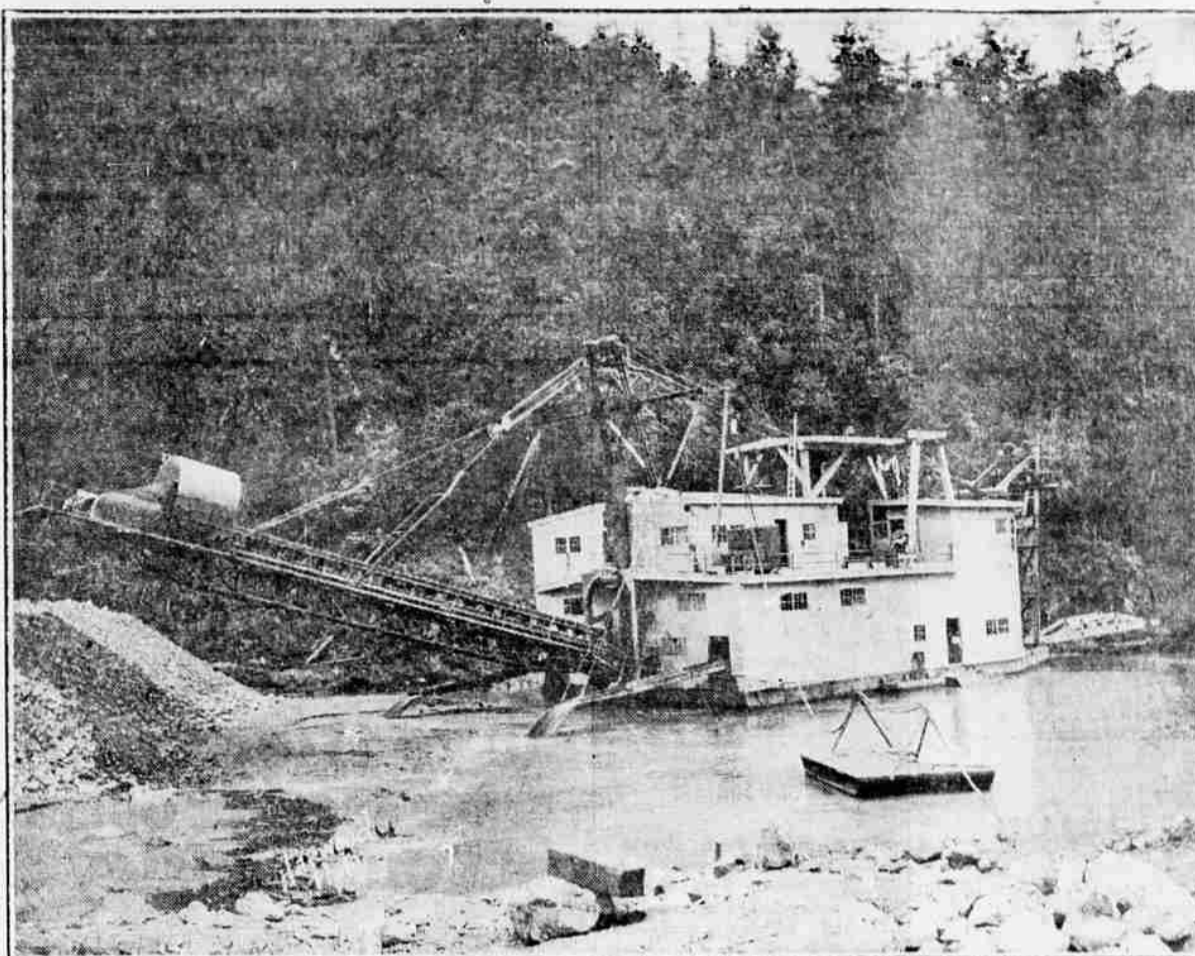

## SCOUT TRAINING SCHOOL FOR MEN LEADERS TO OPEN
