### A Worth While Judge

Another evidence of the non-partisan opinion of the people of the state regarding Judge Charles M. Thomas of this city, is evidenced by this editorial by J. E. Irvine, editor of the Oregon Journal, which appeared Friday of last week:

"Advocate and exemplifier of a court of justice conducted as a pleasure trip to Klamath Falls yesterday. Judge Charles M. Thomas of Medford is Republican, nominated for circuit judge in the First judicial district, comprising Jackson and Josephine counties.

"Crime is rampant in the United States. The dawdling and delays in courts enable the crooks to laugh at the law. Thieves, bandits and burglars are just around every corner from a court, carrying on their game of pillage and plunder.

"The administration of the criminal law in the United States is a disgrace to our civilization, said former President Taft, referring to the antiquated methods of judicial practice and procedure in our courts. The annual blood roll of the nation and the criminal cost of crime, now estimated at \$12,000,000,000 to \$14,000,000,000 a year in America, example a state that is a national scandal and that makes the United States a paradise for crooks and a subject of just among the nations.

"No judge anywhere has worked harder and not further in clearing the rubbish out of prisons and procedure than has Judge Thomas, commissioned by the people to be the judge of his court, he has been the judge, instead of allowing opposing lawyers to determine when losing cases shall be tried. In general, let the lawyers and such judges as haven't the backbone to say 'No' to the lawyers that cause the delays, farther away the time of courts, longest dockets, and thereby increase the cost of courts to the taxpayers.

"From the bench he has devoted himself to the simplification of procedure in his court. He has given the people of his district a court that is a model in the ordering, prompt and economical dispatch of business.

"The reelection of such an official ought to be non-partisan and unanimous."
