## BUT ONE TEAM LEFT AFLOAT IN CONFERENCE

### Coast Teams Experience Rough Sailing In Conference Race — Cardinals Have Only Spotless Record — Two Games On Saturday Card.

By Russell J. Newland (Associated Press Sports Writer) SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Buffeted about by some of the roughest football weather in years, Pacific Coast conference eleven swung into the mid-season week today with only one of their number boasting a spotless conference record.

Stanford's Cardinals settled down to practice today designed to further perfect a "formation 12," the new line-up system that is the brain child of Coach Glenn Warner and which some critics say is going to revolutionize football.

From the formation, with the two halves stationed in back of the tackles, the quarterback several feet behind the center and the full-back to the rear and left of the quarter, the Cardinals run off a house-pass that keeps an alert pair of eyes jumping to locate the ball.

Every week has seen improvement and last Friday Stanford literally dazzled Idaho's vandals to send the big northern team back home on the short end of a 47-0 score. It made three conference wins for the Cardinals, and, with no defeats of loss, they are now the leaders of the major western circuit. Stanford has a "breather" next Saturday in Fresno State, and will use the game to point at Southern California a week later.

Two Saturday games are listed for next Saturday between Washington and Oregon State at Seattle and Idaho versus University of California at Los Angeles, at Moscow. The latter triumphed 20-0 last Saturday but the game was non-conference.

Washington, member of the "Big Four," along with Stanford, California and Southern California, took an unexpected but none the less terrific wallop from Oregon last week end, the score being 27-0. It was a hard blow to the Huskies, who had previously defeated Montana and expected to come to Stanford November 17 with a clean slate. Both Washington and Oregon now have won and lost a game.

California's Bears and Southern California's Trojans, each holding one conference victory, met, battled and departed last Saturday, and the question of superiority is still unsettled. They played to a scoreless tie before 78,000 persons at Berkeley; the second largest crowd coaxed out in the country so far this year.

Although undefeated, the Bears and Trojans must give way to Stanford leadership as a result of the tie score.

Next Saturday, California faces a tough assignment in the San Francisco Olympic club, an eleven of former college luminaries which already has defeated Stanford. Southern California also has a non-conference game scheduled, taking on Occidental in what should prove to be a romp.

Washington State moved up by showing out Oregon State, 9-7 Saturday. A place kick in the last quarter brought the Cougars their second conference victory. They

## JOIE RAY LOSES FIRST PRO RACE MADISON SQUARE

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Somebody always is taking the joy out of life for "Chesterfield" Ray. When Joie was a miler it was Paavo Nurmi, the famous Finn. At the marathon distance it's El Ouafi, the little dark-skinned, wire raised Arab. Making his professional running debut, at Madison Square Garden last night, Ray, once king of American milers, was distanced by El Ouafi who repeated, by a decisive margin, his triumph over the little Chicagoan in the Olympic marathon at Amsterdam this summer.

The race attracted a crowd variously estimated at from 6000 to 12,000 persons. On the official figures may depend whether Tex Rickard will seek further to interest the public in long distance running. The gallant little runner hung like a shadow to the spindly-legged Arab for more than a score of miles but in the end El Ouafi's superior stamina told. Ray began to falter on the 23rd mile and the Arab, sensing his condition, immediately lengthened his stride and soon picked up a full lap on the American. Before the punishing grind of 26 miles, 385 yards was completed, El Ouafi had stretched his advantage to close upon three laps. His time was 2:44:55-25, remarkably fast for indoor running.

## GOOD WRESTLING TO BE SEEN HERE COMING SEASON

## KLAMATH FALLS ELEVEN IS NEXT FOR LOCAL GRID

Football fans of the city and valley will have an opportunity to see the biggest and best Klamath Falls high school team in its history in action against the Medford team, next Saturday at Van Sooye field, the game to start at two o'clock. The Klamath Falls team has one field idea in its head—to defeat Medford—and in this purpose are backed by business men of the city. They have "pinned" for the Medford game all season, and have won all their games to date. The Klamath team is as big as the locals in line, and are coached by Al Sinclair, a former Oregon line star. Coach Callison figures Klamath Falls, one of the dangerous teams he will meet, owing to his own playing past, and regarding Klamath Falls as a soft spot. Even while training for the Salem team, the mentor was endeavoring to knock this notion out of his team's head, and reports he had little luck.

All the Medford players came out of the game Saturday in good condition, while their foe was badly battered. There was no love lost between the two old rivals. The Salem team had been primed for an air attack, and there was none. Instead Medford aimed at center and the tackles, the supposedly strong spots of Salem for huge game. The visitors started with a six man defense but soon changed to seven and still their line leaked like a sieve. Medford repeatedly ripped through center and the tackles, and the players had a pleasant afternoon, telling their opponents where the plays were going, and how many yards they would make.

The Medford team was out this afternoon and heard from Coach Callison where they made errors last Saturday and went through a light street practice.

## NON-DISCUSSION AMERICAN DEBTS IN REPARATIONS

PARIS, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Premier Poincare and Winston Churchill, British chancellor of the exchequer, it was learned authoritatively today, have agreed that in the coming discussions of reparations that the question of French and other European debts owed to the United States shall not be discussed. They also are agreed that the best course in preparing for a revision of German reparations payments is to mention no capital sums nor terms of years within which the payments shall be made. In regard to sums and terms of years, Hermann Mueller and Gustav Stresemann, respectively chancellor and foreign minister of Germany, hold views identical to those of M. Poincare. They believe it is useless to talk about how much Germany can pay and when, thus confusing and embarrassing the special committee to which revision will be referred. The allied governments concerned are themselves not quite sure as to what sums they can expect and the German government has not formulated any proposals. The only preoccupation of the governments at present is to form a committee to draw up general terms of reference.

## STATE MAY SHARE INSURANCE SUIT

SALEM, Oct. 22.—(AP)—The Automobile Abstract & Title company of Detroit threatens to demand that the State of Oregon share in making good an alleged loss of \$2,000,000 by that concern caused by state infringements on a patent and copyright in "Certificates of Title" acts. This warning is received by the state in an air mail letter received today by Governor Patterson. He turned it over to Secretary of State Hoss, who will refer it to Attorney General Van Winkle. The letter lists 21 states that are accused. "Your state is to enjoy in suit," says the letter, "along with those other states which have likewise unlawfully usurped the rights of this privately-owned business."

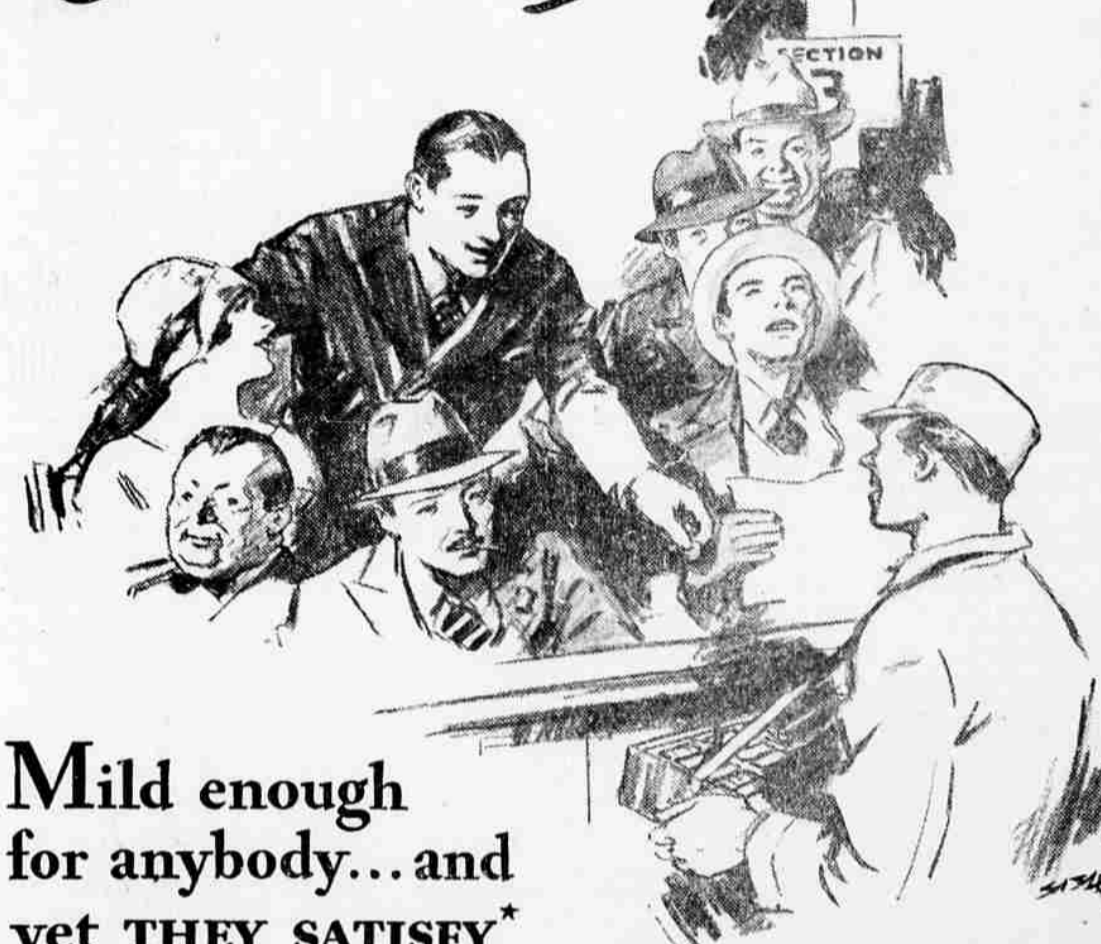

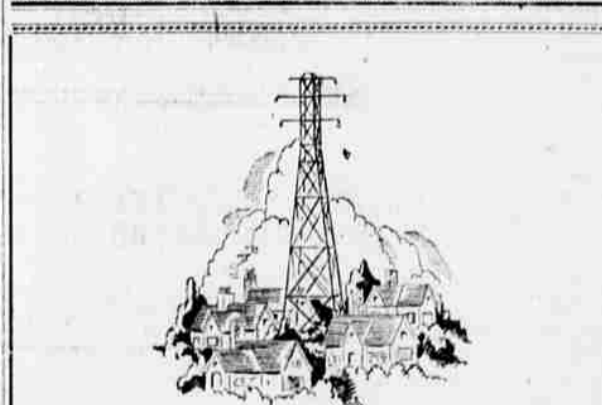
