ASHLAND, Oct. 22. (Special)—Geneva Lucas and Laura Lucas, aged 12 and 14, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Lucas of 541 Fairview street, are still reported to be lost. The girls both attend junior high school in Ashland and have not been seen since last Thursday afternoon, when they left home. Mrs. Lucas has been employed at the cannery and failed to find the girls at home when she returned Thursday evening. Some of their school friends are said to have stated that the girls had planned to run away from home, so possibly they will be picked up by the authorities.

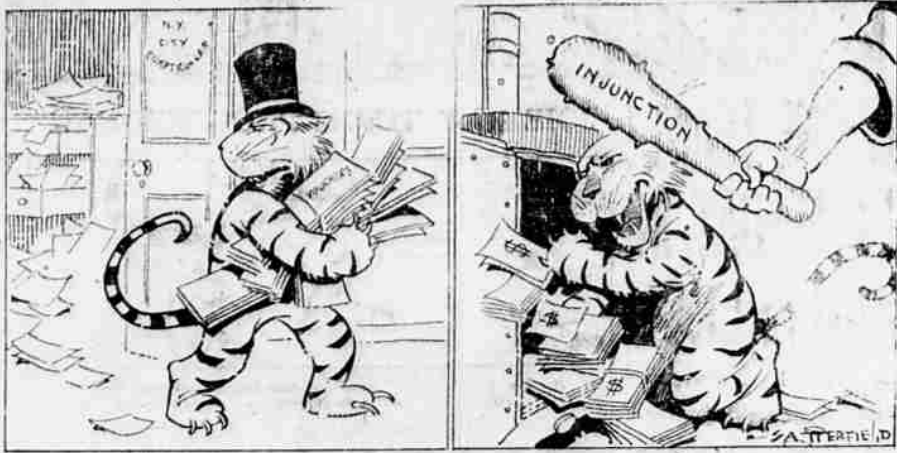
