SINGLE STANDARD IS FAVORITE FOR LIGHTING SYSTEM

The city council will probably adopt the single light standard for the proposed new uniform lighting system in the business district of Medford, the movement for which grew out of the recent agitation of Sixth street property owners for an improved lighting system for their thoroughfare...

This adoption of a uniform single lighting standard over the double standard was informally favored by the city council committee of lights, consisting of John J. Buchler, chairman, F. M. Kershaw and A. C. Hubbard, both thru their own investigations and as a result of hearing expressions from property owners of the business district generally, and others at a public meeting held last night to learn of preferences.

J. C. Thompson, manager, and other representatives of the local California Oregon Power company and members of local electrical companies, who were present, also favored the single standard, as best adapted for a city of Medford's size, with a uniform system of unit posts, which could be later converted for double standard use, if at any future time that standard was wanted.

The Sixth street property owners in their original petition had asked for the double standard, but are agreeable to the single standard if it is adopted for the uniform system. The council committee on lighting will, before next week's council meeting, make a formal recommendation of the single standard, which will be embodied in the Sixth street ordinance before it is passed. While the business men of Main street, Riverside, Central avenue and Bartlett street have as yet made no request for a better lighting system, the city officials think that it is inevitable that they will do so when the Sixth street lighting improvement is inaugurated.

No representatives of the business streets other than those of Sixth street attended last night's meet, but the councilmen know that they are now generally favorable for a uniform system of lighting by the single standard.

The type of the unit standard post will also be embodied by the council lighting committee in making its recommendations, and the committee will probably recommend metal posts of some kind, instead of concrete posts, because their being more substantial than the latter.

COUNTY OFFICERS CONFERRED TODAY BUDGET MATTERS

County Judge Alex. Spawson, Commissioner Whitford Bursell, and County Clerk DeLiah Stevens conferred this morning upon the county budget, now in course of preparation for presentation to the taxpayers through the press. The budget as printed will be called for final hearing before the budget committee, at its final meeting in December. The meeting this morning was for the purpose of straightening out minor details, the clerk explaining to the members of the court minor items.

The budget does not differ materially from last year, with the usual increases in some departments and decreases in others. No provisions are made for the salary increase.

The county court has been comparing the Jackson county budget with the budgets of other Oregon counties of similar size, and finds but little difference except in the appointment of the various funds.
