THE RECORD OF THE ABOVE NAMED LAWYERS

Many of these lawyers have been prominent in the practice from the days of Judge Hanna down through the administrations of Judge Calkins. Can you imagine either of these dignified, ethical judges referring to anyone of these men as "conspirators" or "Political Rule or Run Lawyers"?

THE THOMAS RECORD

Judge Thomas has resided in Jackson County, Oregon, for fifteen years last past. During the last twelve of those years he has held political office.

He has used the prestige of his office while Judge to impound the Bar Association of Jackson and Josephine Counties to adopt a resolution prepared by himself and his secretary, recommending him for Federal Judge.

He has solicited letters of endorsement for the same position from lawyers practicing under him.

He procured two members of the bar to secure an endorsement for him from other members of the Jackson County Bar, then impugned their motives.

He has, through Bert Anderson and his personal committee, monopolized the Jackson County Central Committee for his own personal use and aggrandizement.

He has used campaign material for Thomas, without the knowledge or consent of many and with the absolute disapproval of a number of the committeemen. The campaign has been active several weeks and no candidate of the Republican party has been mentioned by the Jackson County Central Committee except Thomas, from Constable to President.

He has solicited endorsements hoping for a vacancy on the bench of the Supreme Court of Oregon.

He has, through himself and his secretary, prepared articles laudatory of himself and given them to the newspaper for publication. For example, the editorial published in the Grants Pass Courier in 1925, and recently reprinted in an editorial in the Daily News.

PORTER J. NEFF

In a recent radio address, speaking on behalf of the candidacy of C. M. Thomas and under the auspices of the Jackson County Republican Committee, said:

"I hate prohibition like an abolitionist hated slavery."

Six years ago, Mr. Neff prophesied in his speeches all over the county, that if Thomas was elected, we would have a political judge and that cases would be decided according to which side carried the most votes. Nothing has occurred in the last six years to change anyone's opinion. Thomas was a politician then and Thomas is a politician now.

OUR CONCLUSION

We believe Judge Thomas places political expediency before principle. He takes with him his political prejudices when he occupies the Circuit Court bench as Judge. We believe he himself has demonstrated his lack of qualifications and temperament for this high office.

ALMOST 100 PERCENT POLITICIAN

Thomas has been a political office holder twelve out of the fifteen years of his Jackson County residence. During the past six years, while sitting as the judge of this district, he used the prestige and power of his high office in violation of the canons of judicial ethics, prepared by Chief Justice William Howard Taft of the Supreme Court of the United States, to secure the endorsement of members of the bar for appointment to the federal bench.

MANY REASONS FOR OPPOSING THOMAS

There are many more and cogent reasons for opposing Thomas which we propose to set out from time to time. These reasons will be supported by the records of his own court and the Supreme Court.

We believe we can convince any unbiased mind of Judge Thomas' utter unfitness to hold this high position and that our opposition is actuated solely by high and honorable motives.
