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'ANN MANAGES' IS BELIEVED FINEST DRAMA ON RADIO

Generally conceded to be the best radio drama Miss Helen Norris has yet written, the Bible play, "Ann Manages," which was broadcast over KMEM, the Mail Tribune-Virgin station last night by the "Copes" players, moved along with a smoothness and finish that could be marred only by staccato.

Jo Murray Foster, who played the long and difficult title role, did the best piece of vocal characterization she has attempted so far, and she to be congratulated for the overwhelming state she contributed to the success of the play.

Fletcher Fish, played the part of the mountain lover with a fetching drawl that remained interesting and consistent throughout. Harold Corliss handled the part of Bill Higgins, Ann's father, with a fine understanding of character and provided not only some of the best drama in the play, but also many of the best laughs. Miss Melba Williams was excellent in the role of the designing widow.

And Earl Davis, who directed the production and played the juvenile role of Tom as well as the "drummer," deserves special mention not only for his ability as a director and a quick character artist, but for a native sense of humor which enables him always to pick up the loose ends of a production and mend them into something rather delightful for immediate consumption by a national public.

The girls were told the food value of milk and green vegetables, and urged to eat and drink plenty of both, as protection against tuberculosis, which statistics show flourishes among girls of high school age.
