

LUMBER COMPANY SUBMARINE EXPERT
MAPPING ROUTES IS SON-IN-LAW OF
JACKSON COUNTY MRS. JAS. H. OWEN

The Owen-Oregon Lumber company of this city, owners of vast tracts of timber in eastern Jackson county, has completed a railroad survey, and has started another in that section, according to James H. Owen, general manager. The first survey runs from a point 10 miles south of Bute Falls, in a general southerly direction, to a point three or four miles from the store at Lake o' the Woods, and thence to the summit of the Cascades. The survey also taps the Fish Lake district. The general manager said that the survey had started "down Bute creek towards Medford, but hit a snag."

Mr. Owen further stated that "a survey over the Cascades had wound up in a 'No Man's Land,'" and added, "It is just as important to get down off a hill as to climb it."

Asked regarding the report that a surveyor was working in the Grants Pass district, Mr. Owen said "He might have been our man who was down there straightening out some trespass lines."

The general manager refused to give the name of his chief surveyor, and said he intended to keep him in the field as long as the weather permits.

"The Owen-Oregon company is making the surveys," said Mr. Owen yesterday, "solely for the purpose of gaining information regarding the country and finding the most feasible and cheapest grades. It is our business to know as much about the lay of the land in that section as the next one, and that is our purpose, based on good business."

KLAMATH GAME TO GIVE 2ND STRING CHANCE FOR PLAY

The lowly second string men of the Medford high school football team, who have been knocking the rough spots off the regulars all season, and squinting on the bench watching their play, will get their chance to shine and win their letters next Saturday, in the game with Klamath Falls, with provisions.

Coch Callison told all hands last night that he expected the first string "to get a few touchdowns in the first half, and let the men who made you what you are," come out here and hear the girls yell at them."

The second string is therefore going through a rigid course of sprouts this week, with the regulars playing defensive. Tonight they will have a high-powered scrimmage.

Coch Callison made it plain to the squad that the second string would not go into action until the game was on ice, "and I expect you to hold your own and make a few touchdowns yourself."

The second string has any number of good players in its ranks, and the coach is anxious that they should get under fire and have a few games under their belt for next season. In Applegate the scrubs have a fast halfback who lacks experience; Metz, Sprague and Ossie Newlin, line-men, and Mason center, a big boy who is under study for Bernie Hughes' job next year. There is also Jack Walker, who is built close to the ground like Connie Conrad.

The game next Saturday promises to be hard fought, as the rivalry between the two teams is strong, and Klamath Falls has her heart set on winning and will bring a large delegation of voters, Medford and valley fans are advised that the game starts at two o'clock, as will all games on the local field this season.

COMPANY OFFICIAL WILL VISIT PLANT

Henry R. Lovejoy of Janeville, Wis., secretary of the Owen-Oregon Lumber company, will arrive in this city next Saturday for a conference with James H. Owen, general manager of the local plant, and an inspection of the local mill and logging camps at Bute Falls.

Winter operation plans of the Owen-Oregon company in this section will be discussed, Mr. Owen said yesterday.

He left last night for Portland, where he will meet Mr. Lovejoy, and attend the Northwest Logging congress, and return with him to this city Saturday.

PRISONERS ESCAPE FROM McNEIL ISLAND

Two prisoners, Dominick A. Genaki, 23, sentenced from Tacoma, and LeRoy Beebe, 33, from Great Falls, Mont., escaped from the federal prison at McNeil island last Monday.

Captain Sloan Danenhower of New York City, a recognized authority upon submarines, their construction and mechanism, and the inventor of many valuable contrivances for underwater work, including the submarine torch, is a son-in-law of Mrs. James H. Owen of this city, and is now engaged in a work which, if successful, will remove all the terrors of submarines, by providing for prompt rescue and salvaging when stranded upon the floor of the ocean.

Captain Danenhower is now conducting the "Defender," the first submarine, to be placed in service in the United States navy, and will use it in experimental rescue work. A picture of the "Defender" after alterations and ready for a trip, appeared in the Oregonian of last Sunday. The Fox News reel, at an early date, will show pictures of the "Defender" beneath the waves.

Captain Danenhower has invented a trap door which is in use upon the "Defender." The door is so constructed that it can be opened and closed at any depth of water. This permits divers to come and go.

When a submarine is in distress as was the S-4 last winter, the rescue ship proceeds to the scene and lowers, as near as possible to the lost U-boat. The divers are ejected from the trap door, and proceed at once to the rescue of the imprisoned crew. Captain Danenhower has patented a drill for boring a hole in the side of a submarine, through which fresh air and oxygen can be piped. His inventions allow for a speedy location of any wrecked submarine, and the rescue of the crew. In the case of the S-4, it will be remembered, valuable time was lost in locating the hull.

Captain Danenhower's boat is also equipped with mushroom anchors which prevent it from moving on the floor of the ocean, being held firm by air pressure. The experiments of Captain Danenhower are in an advanced stage and practically assured of success, and are even now regarded as a valuable contribution to naval and salvage work.

The newest hotel in San Francisco, the Sir Francis Drake, built at a cost of \$5,000,000, opened Tuesday, and was visited by thousands of people from all over the Pacific coast.

This strictly modern hotel, located at Powell and Sutter streets, near the shopping, financial and theater centers, is 25 stories high, has 600 guest rooms with features absolutely new to the west. Garage in basement, dining rooms, cafe, coffee shop are some of the other features.

The furniture and draperies of the Sir Francis Drake accommodate themselves to the architecture, which was designed mainly in the spirit of the early Renaissance. Every single piece of furniture was designed and made especially for the very space where it is fitted in.
