

**NOTICE OF SCHOOL ELICTION TO INCREASE TAX MORE THAN 6 PER CENT OVER THAT OF THE PREVIOUS YEAR**

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of School District No. 49 of Jackson County, State of Oregon, that an election will be held in said District at Junior High School on the 15th day of November, 1928, from 2:00 P. M. to 7:00 P. M. to vote on the question of increasing the amount of the tax levied in said District for the year 1929 by more than 6 per cent over the constitutional limitations. The actual tax increase proposed for 1929-30 in this budget is actually less than .0024 over the preceding year. It is necessary to raise this additional amount by special levy for the following reasons:

1. Payment of outstanding indebtedness.
2. Increased maintenance costs because of additional enrollment and rooming in operation.

**NEW JONES STORE  
OPENS TO PUBLIC  
ON SAT. MORNING**

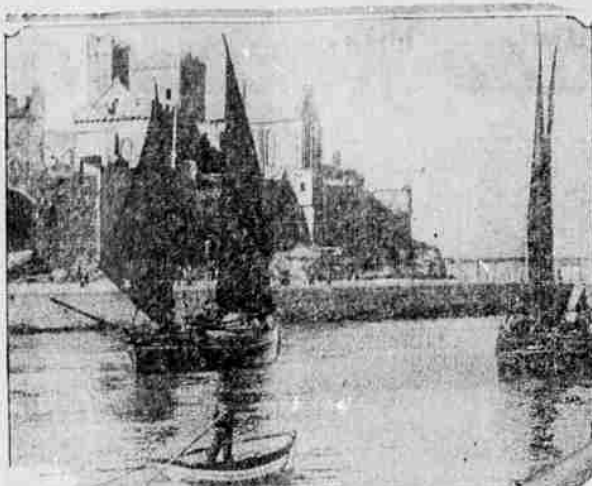
The beautiful new grocery and meat market to be operated by Jones & Company on North Central in the space formerly occupied by the Ulrich grocery, will be open to the public Saturday morning, according to Ralph E. Brown, manager.

With a \$15,000 produce stock on hand, the new market bids fair to be one of the most complete and attractive of its kind in the city, and will be run, according to the manager, on a cut-price basis. This is possible through supplying the stock from the Jones wholesale warehouse, from which the several stores in the grocery chain are stocked.

The fresh vegetable, fruit and meat products will be purchased from the valley, not only for the local store, but to a great extent for the other stores in the chain.

The store, which has a 50-foot frontage, has been completely remodeled and repainted for the opening. From the display windows in front to the stock rooms in the rear, entire new fixtures have also been installed, which give the store the appearance and conveniences of all the late developments in modern market equipment.

Explorers in Old Manx Castle**

PEEL, Isle of Man, Oct. 23.—An expedition, supposed to have been hidden in Peel Castle as far back as 1248 by Orry, the Icelandic pirate-king, is to be sought by an expedition now being organized under the auspices of the British and Isle of Man governments.

Legend has it that vast quantities of valuable loot and historical relics were buried by the Norse kings who ravaged the British and Mediterranean coasts five or six hundred years ago.

The imperial government at Whitehall, which now owns the castle, has given permission for the work, which will be under the supervision of J. E. Douglas, Isle of Man government surveyor, assisted by G. H. Quilliam, clerk to the Peel town commissioners, and P. M. Keimode, who represents the Antiquarian society of the Isle of Man.

Several old gold coins and other articles of value have already been found, thus giving color to the old legend of buried gold that has been hunted down for hundreds of years in Manx families.

The ruins of the castle stand on seven acres of massive rock, linked to the mainland by a modern causeway. Within the castle grounds are earthworks believed erected by men of the Stone Age, and burial places in the form of long barrows, used hundreds of years before Christ.

The great natural fortress was employed by the early Christian monks and missionaries, the Norse pirates and sea-kings, smugglers, and the Celtic raiders.

**NINE FILIPINOS IN  
AUTOMOBILE SPILL  
NEAR REDDING**

REDDING, Cal., Oct. 23.—(AP)—Nine Filipinos were injured, three probably fatally, physicians said, when an automobile in which the men were driving from Seattle south was knocked over a 175-foot embankment by collision with another machine.

The injured were brought here to a hospital. Nurses said they had been unable to learn any of the patients' names.

The injured were members of a party of 17 Filipinos of whom 15 were headed for Stockton to seek work. The other two were bound for San Francisco.

The leading automobile was struck from behind by the machine following and skidded over the bank. Three of the injured were pinned under the car of which the others were scattered about, depth down which the machine had rolled. Besides the three expected to die, three were seriously injured and three cut and bruised.

**PARKED CAR IS  
MURDER SCENE IN  
LOS ANGELES, CAL**

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Without speaking a word, two men early today slipped up to the parked automobile in which Ralph O. Trump, 26, and Miss Marjorie Ulmen were sitting and while one covered the girl with a pistol his companion placed a gun against Trump's chest and discharged it, she told authorities. Trump died as police rushed him to a receiving hospital. His assailants escaped in the darkness.

Questioned by police, whose she had turned in an alarm, Miss Ulmen said she and Trump had passed the car in front of her home shortly before the two men

appeared. She gave authorities a minute description of the pair, each of whom, she said, was about 20 years old.

Relatives of the slain man said he was a graduate of the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Neb., and that he had come to Los Angeles several months ago. He was employed by an advertising firm.

Expressions of relatives that Trump's case comparatively unknown here and had no enemies led police to believe that if he was not the victim of a deliberate shooting, he had been mistaken for another person.

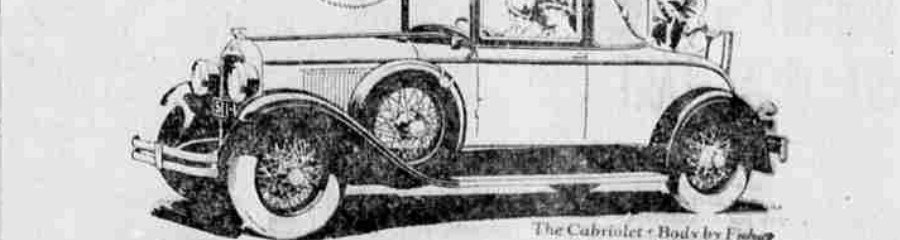
