

ABSENT LAD HOME THIS MORNING TO ANXIOUS MOTHER TRIALS AND JOY FORUM IS TOLD

"Well, here I am" This was the simple greeting Edwin Smith, 14-year-old prodigy, gave his anxious mother, Mrs. T. M. Smith, as he stepped off the train before her this morning. Edwin, who disappeared from home last week, was the object of a radio broadcast Sunday night by his parents, who associated his disappearance with that of Ralph Tremaine, 12, another local boy, who was missed the same day. They also believed his disappearance was the result of a whipping given him by his father in the morning for Edwin's association with company disapproved of by Mr. Smith.

The boy was located by the chief of police at Roseville, Cal., who took him into custody and notified the parents Tuesday. Mr. Smith wired a ticket for the boy's return transportation upon receipt of the telegram, but no further answer was received until the boy stepped off the train this morning.

Ralph Tremaine returned to Medford last night, and was questioned by both Chief of Police McCredie and the Smiths. He is said to have told different stories each time about when he had last seen his companion.

After greeting his mother, Edwin was taken to the police station for questioning by Chief McCredie, who had Ralph Tremaine in the back seat of the car. The two boys nodded to each other rather coldly and otherwise exchanged no other greeting.

ZEPPELIN BALKED BY ADVERSE WIND MAY START TODAY

LAKELAND, N. J., Oct. 25.—(AP) Balked by adverse winds and unfavorable weather conditions, the Graf Zeppelin on her midwest tour last night, Dr. Hugo Eckener today hoped the start could be made this evening.

The postponement was made when the weather bureau reported a low pressure area over the midwest which Dr. Eckener felt was sure to mean low clouds and low visibility, making it difficult for those on the ground to get a good view of the Zeppelin as she sailed overhead. Poor visibility, he said, would defeat the purpose of the flight, which is to show the Zeppelin to the people of the midwest.

A 20 mile an hour wind at the hangar, which would have made hazardous any attempt to remove the big dirigible from her quarters, also influenced the Zeppelin's commander in his decision.

Dr. Eckener has issued a warning against airplane pilots flying too close to the ship during her trip, during which pilots in various cities are planning to act as an air escort.

William, Mr. Hoover, that is the cry of the special interests."

Prosperity Claim
The Democratic candidate also criticized Mr. Hoover's claims to prosperity.

"What are the facts?" he asked. "In one manufacturing city in this state the number of wage earners in industry dropped from 23,200 in 1921 to 24,800 in 1922, a loss of work for 8,500 men and women, particularly in the wooden and cotton mills."

The governor said Mr. Hoover in his Boston address had referred to the wages of textile workers and said they were getting 40 cents an hour, and "for that reason were much better off than the textile workers in any other part of the world."

The governor added the bureau of labor statistics in Washington reported the textile worker received \$17.50 a week.

"On top of that statement," the nominee continued, "let us look at that page ad inserted by the Republican national committee, entitled 'a chicken for every pot.'"

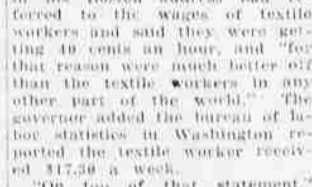

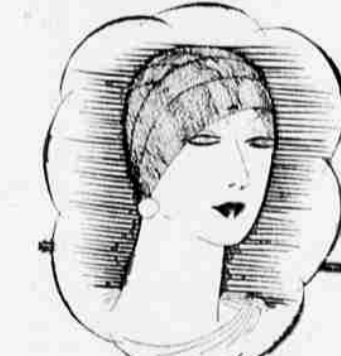

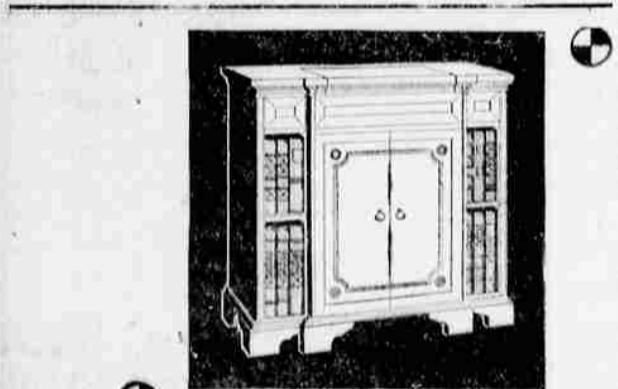
