

FRUIT RATE QUIZ IS ENDED TODAY BY COMMISSIONER

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 26.—(AP) The interstate commerce commission hearing on fruit freight rates from the Pacific Northwest to mid-western and eastern points closed here today. It started before Commissioner Clyde B. Atchison, October 15.

Mr. Atchison announced at the close that the complainant's briefs should be filed with the commission not later than December 31, 1928. The railroads will have time for replies.

Two rebuttal witnesses were on the stand today. G. W. Oliver, Chicago rate expert, was put on by the fruit growers, and H. W. Gilbert, Wenatchee banker.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 26.—(AP) The question whether the Southern Pacific and the Santa Fe railroads shall be authorized to establish part to port freight rates in competition with water transportation, and to offset this reduction by maintenance of higher rates to intermediate points will be heard by the interstate commerce commission in San Francisco November 30. Postponement of the date from November 1 was announced here today by the public service commission.

The Oregon commission will participate in the hearing, it was said, to protect the interests of the intermediate points. To get the ideas of the Oregon shippers in Portland and update points along the Southern Pacific, preparatory for the San Francisco hearing, Edward Ostrander, member of the commission, will hold an informal conference with their representatives in Portland today.

In asking for this authority the railroads seek relief from certain parts of the interstate commerce act. Ostrander said today that it has been the policy of the interstate commerce commission to grant such applications from railroads and to establish a maximum for intermediate short hauls.

Shippers from Ashland, Medford, Roseburg, Eugene, Salem and other intermediate points are expected to have representatives at the conference today.

Others are Princeton-Cornell, Dartmouth-Harvard, Syracuse-Penn State, Georgia Tech-North Carolina, Nebraska-Missouri, and Washington-Oregon Aggies.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—(AP) October coming in like a football team will leave with the roar of a lion as Saturday, October 27, brings natural rivals together in many sections of the country. Few October afternoons have prepared a more bountiful feast for hungry followers of the autumn sport.

Especially in the east is the day rich in football color. Army and Yale, Princeton and Cornell, Dartmouth-Harvard and Syracuse-Penn State are only a few of the games in which interest is centered.

Moving west, Iowa and Minnesota, Michigan and Wisconsin and Nebraska-Missouri are some of the high lights, while in the south the season is in full swing with Vanderbilt-Virginia, Georgia Tech-North Carolina and Georgia and Tulane meeting in games certain to have a bearing on the success or failure of seasons.

Yale and Army have the matter of a 19 to 6 victory for the Elis over the Cadets, brought over by the Army as unfinished business from last year's program. A stung Army team saw Bruce Caldwell toss a pass to Quarrier for a touchdown and later groaned as the great back kicked a field goal to make the Blue triumph complete.

Yale in the same game stopped the crew of Bill Jones right on the goal line and there is some speculation as to whether this can be repeated. Yale has no Caldwell, to throw passes this year and no Quarrier to catch them, but there is a Garvey who can run and a Decker who can place obstacles in the way.

Woman Charged. LIVERMORE, Cal., Oct. 26.—(AP) Mrs. Jessie Ficus was formally charged yesterday with the murder of Philip O'Donnell of San Francisco, who was shot to death on the Ficus farm last Monday. The woman reported that O'Donnell shot himself, but physicians said the man could not have fired the shot.
