WAR WORK WINS VOTES FOR HOOVER

What Herbert Hoover did for Germany after the war is winning him the votes of German-American citizens, according to reports of two Republican national committee women whose state have large German populations. The women are Mrs. Bertha D. Baur of Illinois and Mrs. M. D. Cameron of Nebraska.

Mrs. Baur, a lawyer, was vice-chairman of the Chicago German Relief committee which raised \$750,000 for the starving children of Germany. In that work she came in contact with German-Americans whom she is meeting again in her campaign activities. She finds that the loyalty towards Hoover which developed when he kept their countrymen from starving by organizing adequate relief

the starvation of the Germans. Their gratitude now has a chance to express itself in supporting the man who helped their other country when it was needed. That statement is reiterated by Mrs. Cameron. There has been no communities in Nebraska, she says. She adds: "We are constantly meeting women who say that they find it difficult in organizing Hoover-Curtis clubs in German-American never will forget that Herbert Hoover saved the lives of countless thousands of women and children of the war. It isn't only gratitude that is impelling them to vote for him. His war work convinced them of his humanitarian spirit and his unusual ability for handling a big job competently. No greater proof is needed, they argue, that he will make a great president."
