

MEDFORD DOWNS KLAMATH 31 TO 0 IN SLOW BATTLE

Using second and third string players most of the way the Medford High School football team defeated the Klamath Falls High School 31 to 0 Saturday afternoon.

The game, played on a dusty field before a large crowd, was devoid of features save for a triple lateral pass by Medford that yielded its second touchdown. The other four scores came on power plays.

The visitor's line outweighed the locals but the Medford forward wall of scrubs consistently broke through to throw the Klamath backs for heavy losses.

Klamath Falls, in three attempts to carry the game into the air, were smothered. Medford scored its final touchdown on a long forward pass and a run through a broken field.

The visitors used the hidden ball style of carrying the ball and they fumbled frequently.

The contest started slowly and it was well into the first quarter before Medford struck its stride. Mason, playing center, was nervous and was passing the ball high and wide. He substituted his excellent punter, who played a good game and in the second half broke through to down the man with the ball.

The Medford line stopped leaking and Harrell got away for a long run. Cooksie then took the ball over for the first touchdown on a tackle back and Garnett failed to kick the extra point.

Harrell got away through center for another long run and Cooksie ripped through center for the touchdown.

The third touchdown came when a triple lateral pass, Cooksie to Anderson to Harrell, bewildered the visitors and Harrell scored.

In the final minutes of the first half Melvin replaced Garnett and on the first play had a 47 yard run. He tackled five yards away from the goal as the whistle sounded, closing the half.

Harrell scored the fourth touchdown on a split back through center.

The final touchdown came when O. Newlin snared a pass from Potter and ran 29 yards.

Statistics on the game show that Medford made 12 first downs and Klamath Falls three, with a total yardage of 218 yards from scrimmage while Klamath Falls secured 67 yards.

Olsen was the best ground gainer for Klamath Falls with a total of 38 yards.

A large delegation of Klamath Falls High School students attended this game and gave a fine exhibition of school spirit.

The Medford squad played under caps throughout the contest and in the second half Coach Callison sent in his entire second and third strings.

LOWA FIELD, IOWA CITY, Ia., Oct. 27.—(AP)—Iowa defeated Minnesota 7 to 0 before a frenzied crowd of 30,000 homecoming spectators today.

After three scoreless periods, Minnesota crashed over with a touchdown early in the fourth, with Iowa counting a few seconds later. Hoode, the Minnesota backfield star, picked up a punt on his nine yard line and raced 21 yards for a touchdown. Brockmeyer, however, failed to kick the goal, and on the first play after the kickoff, Pape, substitute sophomore halfback, squirmed away from the Minnesota team and raced 62 yards for no lying score. Nelson's drop kick decided the issue.

SECOND TEAM OF CALIFORNIA LOSES; IDAHO IS VICTOR

MEMORIAL STADIUM, BERKELEY, Oct. 27 (AP)—The age and experience of the San Francisco Olympic club gridder was pitted against the youth and fight of the University of California second string footballers here today and the club men returned the visitors by 12 to 0 count. A crowd of 25,000 fans saw the game.

The Olympians scored on the first play after receiving a California kickoff when Morton Keer, halfback, dashed 47 yards around end to cross the Bears' goal line. The club men's interference worked perfectly with every California griddler, including the safety man, Harry Bruno being taken out.

Pat Wilson, quarterback, sent a go-kick through the bars but the extra digit was disallowed the club men for offside.

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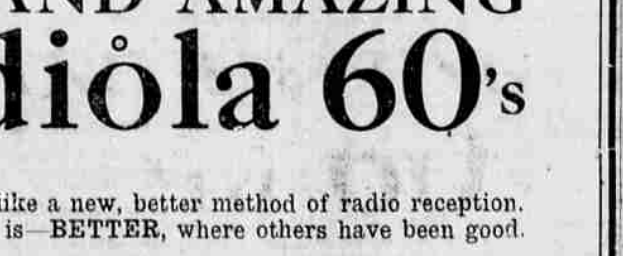
