

# ROTARY HEARS BEAR HUNTING IS SUPPORT PLEA ON BOND ISSUE

### Carkin Details Need For Fire Equipment And New Hall Construction — Insurance Lower If Protection More Adequate.

A plea was made at today's noon luncheon of the Rotary club by City Attorney John H. Carkin for the support of the people of Medford for the city amendment authorizing a \$30,000 bond issue for the purchase of new fire equipment and the construction of a new fire hall. He was the only speaker of the luncheon and was followed by an interesting program arranged by Earl Davis, featuring Prince Gomaluk of the Isle of Guam.

In comparison to cities of similar size, said Mr. Carkin, Medford possesses a poorly equipped department, consisting mainly of only one good piece of apparatus, a 1200 gallon Stutz pumper. The other apparatus, while usable, is far out of date and will be discarded for new equipment if the people of Medford see fit to vote the bond issue.

Astoria, he pointed out, while only a little larger than Medford has four separate fire stations and Salem, hardly twice as large as this city, has four pumps. Good fire equipment, it was shown, will mean a saving to the taxpayer in knowing that his city is reasonably safe from a destructive conflagration.

The sum of \$12,000 would be spent for the construction of a new fire hall and the remaining amount of the \$30,000 would be spent for one new pumper and one combination pumper. These trucks, in addition to many minor needs, he said.

Mr. Carkin took as examples conflagrations in Klamath Falls, Glendale, Cottage Grove and Lebanon last year, and told of Rotary club progress in that county, where at the present time there is only one club. However, three more are now being organized. Another was read from Dr. Charles Peabody in New Zealand commenting on the receipt of a package of winter blue grass seed by the local club and one communication came from W. R. Gibbet at Great Falls, Mont., withdrawing his membership from the Medford club, having been transferred to the Montana district from this city.

M. N. Hogan in a communication as head of the Crater Lake Boy Scout council thanked the club for making its drive for funds a success, adding that the council had wiped out its deficit. Latest total for the drive had reached \$123.25, but is believed to be higher at the present time.

A pleasant half hour was furnished before the meeting adjourned. Prince Gomaluk, who in a wicker costume, told secrets of a number of Rotarians present, answered questions and defied somewhat into the mystery of the future.

# BEAR HUNTING IS NEXT DISH FOR COUNTY NIMRODS

Life continues to be joy with the sportsmen of the valley, and now that the 1928 deer season is a memory and the pheasant and quail hunting season ends tomorrow at sundown, the next morning inaugurates a new variety of game for them, and the fishing and duck seasons have a long time yet to go.

Yes, the open season for bear hunting opens Thursday morning in Josephine and Jackson counties, to last only a month, in accordance with the state law passed to protect the bears in Crater National park. Bear hunting is a somewhat strenuous exercise, as John S. Orth, who had a scratching bear with one of the brain tribe up on the Umpqua divide several years ago, in which the bear was nearly killed to death by the Medford banker's frantic yell and movements, can testify to, and except the most hardy and adventurous sportsmen, the majority of the local sportsmen will do their hunting by radio.

Forest rangers, deer hunters and others, who have been in the hills and mountains the past month or so, say that bear are plentiful throughout this and Klamath counties and that some great sport is in store for the bear hunters if they can only connect at the right time with their quarry.

In general, the closed season protection in Jackson and Josephine counties, except for one month, for the Crater Lake National park bears, was looked out well, for the bears are so prolific and bold since the close of the park season that they are a nuisance and have to be watched carefully else they could carry away the lodge and the government houses and store houses. They have done much damage already in the park.

In addition to the general run of older bears in the park there are nine cub bears there that were born in March, which in addition to being very cute are maliciously and destructively mischievous. The park bears have broken into the lodge, the government cabins at headquarters, and during short absences of the rangers and caretaker, either in quest of food or just a nice quiet place to sleep and rest.

Superintendent C. G. Thompson is authority for the fact that there are nine new cubs at the park that were born last March, although how he knows their age is not exactly known. The cub may be able to tell by hearing their grunts, or he may have looked at their teeth. Anyhow, the park bears, both old and young, are a nuisance in the winter time before they hibernate.

"Anxious to store up lots of food for their annual hibernation," said the bears of Crater Lake are rapaciously looting various cabins and houses at Government Camp," says the Klamath News. "Fort Hubbard recently returned from the lake and told of how a bear family had occupied one house. Despite the fact that the cabin was fumed and fumigated, the bears insisted on remaining. It took decisive measure to finally remove them from the store."
