## Extension of Time Customary When Trial Work Is Heavy

To the REPUBLICAN CENTRAL COMMITTEE,  
Medford, Oregon.  
Gentlemen:

In an article the attorneys recite a list of seven cases, in which extensions of time were given to get out transcripts. When the court reporter is confined to the court room during a long term of court, it is customary to grant him extensions until such time as he is relieved and able to take up the transcript work. This is true all over the state. It was especially true at the time of the continuous trial period referred to. It would be true again if the Court were compelled to move the mass of cases it did move, for about 15 per cent of all cases terminating in trial are appealed.

### Attorneys Usually Responsible for Delay

The attorneys refer to delays in the supreme court as responsible. I agree with such conclusions. One of the points of practice most severely criticised is the delay of attorneys in bringing their cases to final hearing in the supreme court. To illustrate such unwarranted delays, I refer to two cases:

Mt. Vernon National Bank, vs. George Morse, tried before Judge F. M. Calkins. Complaint filed July 16, 1918; decision in supreme court April 4, 1928. Ten years in court.

P. J. Neff, attorney for plaintiff; O. C. Boggs, attorney for defendant.

A. S. Kleinhammer vs. E. J. Cameron et al, tried before Judge F. M. Calkins. This case grew out of the water adjudication on the Little Applegate. It was tried before the State Water Board (Filed) in June, 1912, disposed of in the supreme court on Feb. 7, 1928.

Gus Newbury, attorney for plaintiff; A. E. Reames, attorney for defendant.

This case was in the court 16 years.

In view of such and many other like delays, it is unreasonable to object to a delay on account of temporary conditions.

### Judge Thomas Adopts New Rule to Curb Delay

When the transcript work was rushed and brought up, this Court placed a new rule on the records. Since that time, (March 1, 1927) I have refused to give any extensions for the filing of transcripts except where absolutely necessary in order to enable the party to secure his evidence from the reporter, and I may add that at the present time there is not a single undelivered transcript.

### Fundamental Differences of Opinion Exist

From the many expensive ads in the press, I select one dated Oct. 27, 1928, being practically a full-page of large type, entitled "HAS JUDGE THOMAS SPEEDED UP JUSTICE." Therein the Court is criticised for dismissing cases and therein lies the real fundamental difference of opinion between the attorneys opposing me and myself. They say, "Dismissing old cases accomplishes no good because they must be retained in the files."

### Old Charges and Indictments Should Be Dismissed

A Court is created for the purpose of determining controversies of all kinds, including criminal and civil. The public through governmental agencies, as well as individuals, come with their problems and submit them to the court and jury for decision. The humble defendant is entitled to fair and impartial treatment even against the great and powerful state, and the law contemplates that he should be given a speedy trial. The State should not be permitted to refuse to prosecute, and at the same time stain the reputation of the defendant with the cloud of an indictment. If defendant is guilty, the State should establish it by trial, if not it should admit its inability and dismiss the charge.

### To the Average Layman This Makes Interesting Reading

For a long period prior to January 1, 1923, there existed a practice on the part of a few attorneys of this district of keeping cases on the docket for years with the deliberate purpose of clouding real estate titles and compelling settlement in case of sale. This was nothing short of blackmail, and it has been terminated. A party has no right to use the courts to annoy or harass his neighbor. If he files his case, he should expect that it will be brought to as speedy a conclusion as reasonable under all the circumstances. What is reasonable depends on the facts of each case.
