HAWLEY'S TALK INTERESTING FOR ASHLAND DINNER

ASHLAND, Ore., Nov. 2.—(Special.) Congressman C. W. Hawley of Oregon, introduced by State Senator Geo. W. Dunn of Ashland as the head of the most powerful committee in the world, the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives at Washington, gave a very interesting talk of an hour or more Monday evening at a dinner given in his honor at the Lithia Springs Hotel at 7:45 attended by about thirty-five Ashland citizens.

The distinguished visitor presented his remarks under the title, "The President's Day." He told of the usual routine of presidential duties and also of the manifold matters upon which the president must pass judgment from time to time, calling attention to the fact that the president of the United States is the only man who can talk officially with foreign governments, either personally or through his representatives, regarding diplomatic relations with this country.

Mr. Hawley also mentioned that the president has the responsibility of making treaties with foreign nations, must pass upon all expenditures of our government, except the fixed salaries and expenses of the house and senate, and must give some personal attention to a large portion of his mail daily. "The president takes his duties very seriously," said the speaker, "and inform themselves very thoroughly, through the various experts and departments of the government, before giving out their decisions regarding matters upon which they have to pass."

Representative Hawley has had a long experience in matters of government, having served at Washington in the administrations of five presidents, Roosevelt, Taft, Wilson, Harding and Coolidge.

His accounts of the ways in which governmental matters are handled were exceedingly interesting and kept his hearers at close attention throughout the entire talk.

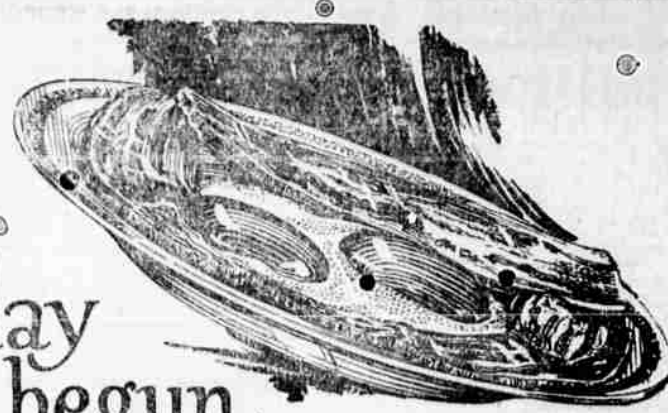
There was a large crowd present to wish Helen and Cecil good luck in their new home.
