

RECORD BROKEN IN MAIL FLIGHT BY PILOT VIRDEN

The north bound high wind prevailing back of his plane from San Francisco on, enabled Pilot Ralph Virden of the Pacific Air Transport mail plane to make a record breaking flight to Medford this morning, winning the daily north bound air mail plane, whose daily schedule time of arrival is at 9 a. m. to the city at 7:40 a. m.

The run from San Francisco to Medford, where the plane leaves at 5:20 a. m. to Medford, thanks to the tail wind, was made in only 2 hours and 40 minutes, whereas the regular flying time is 4 hours.

Immediately after arrival here Virden phoned the surprised post-office, which hurried a messenger to the air field to fetch the air mail. It was sorted at once and placed in the hands of the regular mail carriers, who start out on their first morning delivery at 8:15.

Thus it was that an air mail letter from Los Angeles, and mailed there at midnight last night was delivered to a local Medford home in the residence district by the city carrier on his regular delivery at 8:15 a. m. today. The regular daily flight from Los Angeles to Medford is made in 9 hours, and train service with mail between Los Angeles and Medford is 36 hours.

Again illustrating to Medford people the much faster service of air mail over the regular train mail, Postmaster Warner related today that an air mail letter mailed at the local postoffice last Monday at 10 a. m. for Disneyland, Ind., was later to be sent out on the daily air mail plane, was dispatched by train service to Sacramento, there it connected with the daily transcontinental air mail service on Tuesday morning, and reached Chicago where it had to be transported by train to Hammond, and on Wednesday afternoon reached the person to whom it was addressed, in the regular delivery service.

This was a gain of about three days over regular mail train service, and had the letter been mailed on last Monday from here before the daily air mail departed at 9 a. m., the gain would have been much greater.

The burning of brush and slashings on the Coquina timber tract, which has been under way for a week past, under Lee C. Brown of the forestry service, was discontinued today because the wind made such burning dangerous. There are several more days of such work before the job is finished.

CAMPAIGN FUNDS OVER \$4,000,000 FOR TWO PARTIES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Receipts of both the Republican and Democratic national committees bulked well over the \$4,000,000 mark in reports filed today with the house campaign funds committee.

Reporting their activities up to and including October 31 the Republicans showed receipts of \$2,911,744 while the Democratic figures were \$4,988,522. Both parties had expended nearly all of this money, \$137,383 being left in the Republican chest, and \$92,894 in the Democratic fund.

During the last week in October the Republicans had receipts of \$770,000 while the Democrats received \$1,023,894, but \$500,000 of this was a loan.

JEALOUSY CRAZED BROKERAGE FIRM YOUTH MURDERS SHORT ON MARGIN GIRL AND FAMILY TRIAL DISCLOSES

SANTA ROSA, Cal., Nov. 2.—(AP)—Jealousy and a desire for revenge maddened the brain of a rejected suitor until today he killed the girl he loved, slew her parents with an axe and then shot himself amid the flames of the family dwelling he had fired as a funeral pyre.

This was the interpretation placed by Sheriff E. Douglas Bille on the fire and carnage that wiped out the family of three of C. J. Bertola, retired grocer and brother of Dr. Marianna Bertola, San Francisco society and club leader. The other victims were his wife, Mrs. Maria Bertola, and their daughter, Camille.

Their bodies, with a fourth identified as that of Charles Braker, 45, were found at the Bertola dwelling. Bertola had escaped from the blazing structure before the roof fell in but died later. The other three bodies were buried in the embers.

Sheriff Bille said Braker, who had a divorced wife and son living here, evidently drove to the Bertola residence in a rented automobile. The machine was found parked before the property. He entered the dwelling, in the opinion of the sheriff, and killed his three victims with a hatchet. His motive, besides jealousy, could have been revenge against Bertola, who once ordered him off the place, the officer declared.
